MEETING NOVEMBER 20th 2006

Public Forum. - Letter sent by the council to BT, requiring action on the lack of Broadband provision in the village; another letter sent to Highways re. condition of road at Highdown; traffic speed a concern.

Results of Affordable Housing - Councillors agreed support in principle, but several reservations expressed; a flyer will be sent out with the next Newsletter, to ask who would be interested in living in the affordable housing, if built.

Matters arising from Minutes - Letters received from Colin Breed & Andrew George re. St. Barnabas Hospital. Appointment of doctor again not made, thus still only outpatients' facilities; letter received from Environment Agency re. Penyoke creek. The grass growing there is a naturally occurring, but non-native, colonising grass, which spreads rapidly. This will be monitored by the Environment Agency.

Correspondence - Joan Worth, Parish Clerk, tendered her resignation after 12 years. The post will be advertised.

Affordable Housing

Christopher Lunn, the affordable housing Manager and Rebecca Jacob, the affordable housing Development Officer, attended the parish council meeting on October 16th to report to the parish council the results of the consultation day held on Sept 14th [as reported in the last newsletter]. A large number of parishioners attended the meeting.

Over 60 people came to the open day, and Caradon received 48 written responses to the consultation feedback form. There was a mixed response to views on affordable housing although many identified the need for affordable housing for local people and thought a small development of 6-8 houses would be appropriate. Concerns were expressed however, about the lack of village facilities, problems related to the road network and the lack of public transport serving the

area. The community's views were clear about the site preferences. The most preferred site is opposite the Memorial Hall, the second choice being in Church Lane, third at the top of Coombe Drive and fourth off Coombe Lane.

Following the presentation, council members and members of the public attending asked questions of Mr Lunn and Ms Jacob.

The parish council will discuss the report at the next parish council meeting and if it is agreed to proceed with the process, then Caradon District Council will develop a case for funding for submission to the government and also will develop detailed drawings of the proposed development with the housing association.

The term rounds off with a Christmas Party on 18th, Carol Service and Nativity on 19th and the last day of term is 20th December.

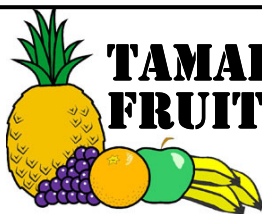
BBC Radio Cornwall Appeal

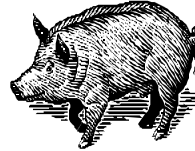

The past year had seen the culmination of many years effort by the association. In excess of £30,000 had been raised to provide the children of the parish with new apparatus on which to play. He said the standard of the equipment was fantastic and the children really enjoy playing on it.

New football posts were put in place in the summer.

The future of the Association was discussed. The current trustees wish to stand down, and new trustees are being actively sought. If no one is willing to become a trustee the Association will discuss the procedure for winding up with the Charity commissioners.

My progress over the years as a Bell Ringer, 1931-2006,

Part 2

My first two learners were new to our parish; I set about this in the same manner as I had been taught. Once they could handle the bell on their own, they were joined by five experienced ringers with me guiding them. One used to sing to himself when ringing, because he said it helped with his timing. New to me but it worked with him. The second ringer in a short time in our parish must still hold a Guild record, - he broke five stays. Stays are a length of ash wood which holds a bell on balance to stop it going in a complete circle.

As time moved on so too did some of our older ringers. Death and various medical problems meant that at times we were down to four.

A meeting was arranged for anyone to attend who was interested to learn the art, and there was a good response. The only one who could not attend that evening was me. Two regular ringers decided who they would teach, and left two ~~ready~~ teenagers for me. Nancy and Richard had retired to Clampit Farm House. I took them on evenings when the others were not around, and they made it into the team.

Only Peter du Plessis from the other

groups stayed. Then there was Ann, who said she had rung as a young girl. A few Saturday afternoons on a one to one and she was back on form. Andrew, a member of a very old local family, became interested.

Ringers from up country touring our area were anxious to ring at Landulph, and I invited them to ring for Sunday service. A couple new to our parish and Church were watching and listening. I asked if it sounded better than normal Sunday ringing, but they would not commit themselves. Next question - would you care to have a go at it? An evening was arranged to suit them, and after an hour or so on a one to one I had Bert and Danusia on my list.

George and his girlfriend Jane were soon to follow. Taking them on a one to one until they could handle a bell unaided made a big difference to their confidence when joining the others, young Richard Best was a natural, it did not take him long. One practice evening Terry and two friends came to visit us - all ringers. Terry is still with us.
