Parish Council Meeting 18th December 2006

Two items were raised in the Public Forum

- a) Continued growth of vegetation in Penyoke Creek.
- b) Vehicle parked in Back Lane, causing potential danger by restricting the width of the carriageway.

Both items discussed by Councillors during the meeting & action agreed. Vacancy for Clerk to Parish Council – agreed advertisement to be placed in Local Press, Parish Notice Boards and Landulph Newsletter, in January 2007.

Affordable Housing - 15 responses to the questionnaire received. It was agreed to defer any decisions to the February Meeting, allowing time for further responses, following a reminder to be sent out with the next Newsletter.

No response has yet been received from BT, in answer to the letter from the Parish Council, regarding Broadband.

Footpath maintenance for Landulph Parish will take place between April and June 2007.

Possible speakers for the Parish Council Annual Assembly were discussed; the Clerk will send a letter of invitation.

The Parish Precept for 2007/2008 was discussed and the level of increase agreed.

The road surface between Stockadon and Wayton was discussed and it was agreed to write to Cornwall County Council Highways again expressing concern at its condition.

Planning –Application for planning at Windrift, Cargreen – withdrawn. *Val Oatham*

Parish Council Meeting 15th January 2007

No comments from the public.

General: Affordable Housing to be discussed at February meeting. Two doctors interviewed for vacant post at St Barnabas Hospital, Saltash, but Council noted the disappointing acceptance by MP, Town Council, and PCT that the Minor Injuries Unit would close if recruitment failed. Second letter to be sent to BT re. broadband. Paradise Lane cleared of fallen trees. Letter from Natural England re Penyoke Creek grass ("Spartina"), re-stating that it is a natural colonisation. Council agreed to invite a representative from the Tamar Estuary Conservation Forum to an open, daytime meeting at the creek in April at low water to discuss the matter further.

Parish Councils have no powers but observe the area, especially planning issues, highways, footpaths and any other parish problems together with matters that may arise. Responsibilities are to attend the monthly meetings which are held on the 3rd Monday of the month at 7.30 pm in the Landulph Memorial Hall Annexe.

Landulph Parish has 7 councillors who stand for 4 years.

Publication of Notice of Election this year, is Tuesday 27th March. Prospective candidates are invited to stand and have their nomination papers signed by two persons who must be on the Parish Electoral Register. These papers should be sent to Caradon D.C. by noon on Wednesday 4th April. If there are more than 7 nominations, an election is held, which this year will be on Thursday 3rd May.

It is a very rewarding and worthwhile rôle in the community - one way of learning about the Parish and people who live there.

The farm and the co-op no longer rely on selling their produce to the supermarkets and have instead created a network of local distributors delivering organic vegetable boxes. This has enabled fantastic produce fresh from the farm to be delivered direct to your door.

There are over 85 different types of vegetables grown at the farm. Many of the vegetables are picked one day, and delivered to households the next. **The local distributors are Ian and Emma Bailey,** who live in Plymouth. As they are so close to the farm they pick up early in the morning to deliver to you on the same day.

"It is important to us to be part of making top quality organic vegetables available and it is great to be involved with a business where you get so many positive comments from customers."

There are a range of different sizes of boxes to suit most households' needs. With your box you receive a weekly newsletter, which gives news from the farm and a recipe. There's also other organic produce available to order along with your box such as fruit, eggs, milk, and juices.

For anyone who is interested in changing their shopping and eating habits, ordering a box is a great step.

Landulph Women's Institute

It is with much regret that the Members and Committee of Landulph Women's Institute must advise that, with effect from their Annual Meeting on Tuesday 13th February 2007, their branch will cease to exist. You may have read recently in the National and Local press of other WIs around the country closing, due to the vast increase in subscriptions and the imposition of a magazine being sent to each member (which in part accounts for the rise in subscription), whether they wanted it or not; previously purchase of a magazine was optional. This situation may have contributed to the decision by some members not to rejoin in 2007 but the resolve to close was finally forced upon us by the small number of members who remained, making continuation unviable.

The procedure now is that any monies in the account at the time of closure will be held in suspension by the County Federation for a period of three years. Should Landulph WI re-start within that three year period, these funds will be released to assist that group to reconvene.

My Progress Over the Years as a Bell Ringer 1931-2006 by Les Clark

Part 3

With three, sometimes four, regular ringers, we had to blend in eight new ringers to listen and get to know the sound of the bell they were ringing.

Obviously it took a long time, but with a little encouragement, their determination and a bit of fun when at times it goes wrong, I have a band of ringers I am proud of and I have enjoyed every minute of it. There have always been ladies ringing, but at the Millennium we celebrated with a team of lady ringers, the first we have had since 1921, when a team of 6 ladies rang to celebrate the visit of the then Prince of Wales and Duke of Cornwall to Landulph.

A few years ago a group of students from Japan visited us. They climbed to the bell chamber and were shown how things worked there and on their descent they all wanted a go at it. I could only take them on as I would any learner, but they surprised me. They took home a video and recording of our bells.

Cargreen Rainfall 2006

November total 161mm (6.44ins). This was 50mm above average. Highest 24 hour fall 36.5mm on the 24th. Precipitation recorded on 19 days.

December total 131.7mm (5.5 ins). Highest 24 hour fall 28mm on the 29th. 21 days of rainfall.

Total for year 2006, 1012 mm (40.48 ins), below the yearly average of 46 ins.

Highest monthly total 172mm in October with a 24 hour fall of 51.5mm was the highest for the year. This was recorded during 4 hours of prolonged thunderstorms moving south to north over the area. A total of eleven overhead thunderstorms were recorded during 2006. October accounted for six. The most prolonged period of outbreaks were 2nd of July from 1. 30 am until about 2 pm on the 3rd. Rainfall over this period was 25.5mm.

Mobile Library

The number of people using the Mobile Library is regularly monitored by the Cornwall County Library service. Whether this is part of the ongoing and widely reported cost cutting exercise of this service is matter for speculation, but clearly an uneconomical and poorly used service could be under threat. The library bus comes to the parish every other Thursday – see the diary for details. It is used by only a few, so the message and the possibility is clear – Use it or Lose it! *Reg Rice*

Broadband

A broadband survey was conducted during December. We had 35 sheets returned which showed that only a few subscribers to broadband companies had achieved a satisfactory connection and only one subscriber once had 950kb, with the others only getting around 512kb, sometimes intermittently.

Quite a number were still waiting for BT to check their lines, and many are complaining about lack of effort from BT. We had eleven ISPs listed in the survey with the majority being on Eclipse closely followed by Talk-Talk.

The Parish Council have written to BT after their November meeting stating that Landulph is very poorly served and asking when better results can be expected. The council are still awaiting an answer.

We followed this up with an email to BT chief executive Ben Verwaayen who passed the inquiry to Julian Biggerstaff in their broadband dept who replied as follows:

"I have now concluded my investigation, as I have now received all the relevant information with regards the provision of broadband from the Saltash exchange.

The network planning team have carefully considered the availability of broadband in your community who are served from the Saltash exchange. They are conversant with the network issues in your area; however they have reviewed this again on my request and concluded that this area will not be included in the current network program. I hope you can understand that BT's universal service level agreement is to provide a line for telephony, therefore the provision of any additional services has to be commercially viable to the business.

I am aware that this decision will be disappointing and can assure you

that BT is doing all that it can to find alternative ways of supplying broadband to those like yourself, who are currently unable to receive it, due in the main to the length of individual lines from the Saltash exchange."

I have heard of a report in a Cornish newspaper that 99.9% of broadband customers in Cornwall were satisfied; evidently they did not survey Landulph. We will keep you informed via this newsletter as and when and if we get other results.

Cargreen Yacht Club The Jester Challenge - Tony Head in 'Triple Venture'

In the Landulph newsletter for August 2006, my brother Nick introduced the Jester Challenge, a no-frills, low key single handed transatlantic race from Plymouth to Newport RI USA for yachts under 30ft and he went on to describe initial progress in my 28ft Twister class yacht TRIPLE VENTURE. This note rounds off the story.

My personal aims were: (a) get to Newport alive with the boat in one piece, and (b) beat a time of 31 days 17 hours set by Twister CORKSCREW in the 1992 Observer Single Handed Transatlantic Race. This latter dictated that I had to attempt the shorter direct route (about 2,900 miles) against prevailing winds and currents rather than take the longer but generally easier southerly route. Thankfully the race also meant I could avoid the World Cup!

On departure from Dingle, TRIPLE VENTURE was soon back out to 16°W. But another gale on 20 June forced me to heave-to again and reflect on speed-time-distance calculations. A queue of lows near Newfoundland showing up on the weather fax suggested that the direct route was not the way to go in my little boat that year! Accordingly, as the gale moderated, I changed strategy and headed on a southerly route.

There followed some superb sailing on a fine reach, achieving daily runs of 120-140 miles a day. All went well until 250miles NE of the Azores when the wind backed and I had to beat against strong force 6 winds, but at least it was fairly warm. More speed-time-distance calculations and re-reading (for the 100^{th} time) a worrying long range hurricane forecast eventually led me to the conclusion that I could not make Newport RI, or sail back to the UK, before the risk of hurricane activity in the Atlantic became too high for a boat as small as mine. Rather than turn for home, my objective became the Azores; at least I could salvage something and have a foreign run ashore. 3 days of hard upwind sailing (in which a Twister revels more than the crew) saw us in Horta, Faial on 1 July.

To add insult to injury, my first beer ashore (in Horta's Café Sport, of course) had to be endured amongst a riot of Portuguese fans watching on TV the depressing spectacle of Portugal beating England in the World Cup! The cacophony of motor horns and exploding firework mortars lasted all night.

There followed a lazy 2½ weeks exploring the western group of Azores islands and enjoying the warm hospitality of the islanders. Reluctantly, departure was taken from Angra do Herismo, Terceira on 19 July for a fast and bumpy passage home, marred by a terrific and prolonged thunder storm a few days out from the islands, quite the most frightening experience of the whole Jester trip. Finally, and I'm sure much to the relief of my wife Marsha, TRIPLE VENTURE and I arrived safely back in Cargreen on 1 August 2006.

Now for a few statistics for TRIPLE VENTURE: 37 days under way, 3700 miles sailed, average speed 100miles a day. 11 bottles of wine, $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of whisky, 43 stubbies of beer consumed underway. 17 litres of fuel burnt. £450 of Iridium satellite telephone calls made.

What of the future for TRIPLE VENTURE? Plans include an expedition to climb Rockall in 2007, the Jester Azores Challenge in 2008 and the Jester Transatlantic Challenge in 2010. . . It would be super to be accompanied by more CYC yachts in these events! Contact tony-head@lineone.net to discuss further.
