Parish Council Meeting 14th December 2009

Because this meeting was out of synch with the usual timetable, the Annexe floor was still covered with Playgroup toys. Despite this, the councillors held their nerve under the unblinking gaze of several furry animals. In public forum, Jo Butcher asked why Hodders Way **street lights** had not been switched off in the wee small hours, as had been requested months ago. Andrew Butcher promised to look into this. She also pressed for other green initiatives, e.g. communal composting. A reply from Colin Breed MP about the parish's awful **broadband service** suggested that a Babcock company subsidiary might be helpful with a pilot study for the parish, which still has £6K earmarked for that purpose.

A submission by the **Spaniards Inn**

of piles, pontoons and a walkway at the pub riverside took up most of the meeting. To put it mildly, Council was displeased with the lack of consultation between the owners and themselves, and will write to the Arnolds inviting an update, and to DEFRA with appropriate information. Enough said.

Andrew proposed that the revision of the **Parish Plan** be led by Council members, with co-option of members of the public as appropriate.

Planning: Council recommended approval for:

Construction of extensions to east and north elevations (etc) of Clampit Cottage, Landulph. Mr J Grainger.

Meeting lasted 100 minutes.

Parish Council Meeting 18th January 2010

Following last month's stimuli, Justin Arnold has discussed **Spaniards Inn** development with Cllr Gerry Stevenson, and has agreed to attend February's Council meeting to outline options, and (we understand) will be available at the Spaniards Inn immediately after the

meeting to discuss matters with members of the public.

The public **telephone box** is proving a bargain, if only by keeping these meetings chuckling. Roger had more suggestions for its use e.g. a collection point for old batteries,

and mentioned a BT award for the most innovative re-use, with one competing school putting manikins in the box in regularly changing costumes, to stimulate children's creative imagination.

Discussion moved on to a perceived threat that Cornwall Council might reduce refuse collection to fortnightly intervals. Apart from environmental and health issues, it was thought that Council would have to provide all households with rigid bins. If these were too small, there was always the telephone box. And when they discussed provision of extra road grit bins (you've guessed it)... good old telephone box. Relax, they were just joking.

The Parish Council **Annual Assembly** on 15th March at 8.00pm, usually features an invited speaker, but this year will concentrate on informing parishioners about the **Parish Plan** aims, and on electing a Steering Group.

Everyone with the remotest interest in the parish's development in the next five years is urged to attend.

Then there was the problem of Penyoke playground's wooden tractor, which had been turned through 90 degrees on or around New Year's Eve. Because it no longer sat squarely on its protective matting, a warning notice will be placed on it. There was no shortage of male volunteers to relocate it, nominated *in absentia* by lady councillors. With a straight face, the Clerk said that before shifting the tractor, the volunteers should do a risk assessment, train in manual handling, and be provided with appropriate protective gear. (Laughter).

Planning: Council recommended approval for:

Installation of timber shelter/bicycle shed etc. Landulph Primary School.

Meeting lasted 59 minutes.


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Cargreen's Red Phonebox

In our first post of the New Year we received some very exciting news, in that Mrs Gill had been successful with a grant application from 'Awards for All'. The school had been awarded £8,000 to provide the pupils with an outdoor learning Trim Trail, which will be delivered and constructed this term.

We are delighted to welcome Suzanne Jones as our new Parent Support Advisor. Suzanne will help parents/carers maintain positive links with the school and to give support around things like transition stages, attendance issues, family learning, parenting advice and behaviour management to name just a few.

This term sees the start of our links with a primary school in Kenya as part of our development to promote the importance of cultural diversity throughout the school. The school we are linked with is Olare, which is situated in the small village of Kaila approximately 420km west of Nairobi. Olare primary school has 167 pupils with six teachers whose classrooms are made of mud walls, earth floors and corrugated iron roofs. Our pupils are currently creating information about Landulph School to send to Olare and will find out and receive information back from Olare.

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Mary Eastment

Mary is one of the few villagers left who was actually born in Cargreen. During her early years she lived just two doors up from Braund stores next door to her grandparents, Henry and Mary Clark. At that time the cottages belonged to Mr Snell of Rosehill, where her grandfather worked. Mary's mother, Kitty, was one of five children, and sister to Bertha Crabb, originally from Tinnell. Her father Cecil had a poultry business in Landulph, and the family later became market gardeners on land that is now the cricket field. There were also geese, ducks, chickens and a few pigs. One of her fondest memories is rearing chickens in incubators. Since there were no freezers, her mother salted pigs in a trundle to preserve them. Mary attended Sunday school from the age of four and was confirmed in 1951.

Her mother had a stroke aged just 42, leaving Mary to look after her parents from an early age. She cooked her first Christmas dinner, a goose, aged 12. Her father's brother, Uncle Bert, and Auntie Ida played an important part in her life and were always there for her. She was a Brownie, and later a Guide, in the troupe run by her aunt, Bertha Crabb. She attended 'Cross College' from the age of five until fifteen when she left and joined the family business. One of her tasks was to drive the van into Plymouth with produce for the markets.

Mary regularly visited the Regal cinema in Saltash travelling on one of the buses that came three times a week, but often missed the end of the film as the bus returned at 11pm.

Keen on sports, Mary learned to swim in the river, and recalls three or four wrecks the children would dive off.

She and her friends raised funds towards the parish hall, holding mini markets and garage sales in the Rectory Room. Mary's uncle, Harold Clark, served in the first World War, gaining the French equivalent of the military medal, and it was he who cut the first turf when the Memorial Hall was started. A member of the Church choir and keen dancer, she was also involved in choir suppers and fetes for church funds held at Landulph Rectory.

One of her passions in sport was badminton, and she and husband Ken were keen supporters and members of the Landulph badminton club, using the hall she had worked so hard to support. She was the Ladies Singles winner.

Mary married Ken Eastment from Landrake, and in 2008 the couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. They have a daughter, Brenda, and two grandchildren, Liam and Gavin, of whom they are very proud. She has lived in her present home, Bounds Tenement, for 65 years and delights in telling me her work in the gardens only ended when she married a Plumber!
