#### Parish Council Meeting 17 May 2010

Dear David and Nick, thanks for all the recent letters. You could never have guessed their effect, or that one letter with two signatures would have done the trick. As you settle into your new jobs be reassured that here in Landulph the Parish Council is coping with equal challenges, and meeting them with lantern-jawed determination.

The annual election to specific posts was dispatched swiftly by appointing the same chairman, vice chair etc. We believe in stable strong government here too. No specific posts were available for councillors Cradick, West or Lipscomb, but they may be useful as Minister without Portfolio, Roving Ambassador, and Chairman's Rottweiler, but not necessarily in that order. I hope that George and Vince are working well to balance the books; they could take a leaf from our book, because our Council has saved nearly £400 a year by changing its insurer. That's 3% of our parish precept. Bet you're jealous. As new boys yourselves, you'd have sympathy with our clerk and councillors who had to consider the renewal of a 10-year lease agreement on the cricket field which was gifted to the council 10 years ago, long before any of them were on the Council. It emerged that they did not know whether the Council owned the cricket pavilion, whether the pavilion was insured by the tenants, or whether the toilets were fit for use.

You won't understand this, but someone suggested that our disused telephone box might serve as a loo. You probably won't understand either why the council was pleased to report that garden refuse can be collected by the normal refuse truck on Tuesdays, provided the greenstuff is in the approved bags, on sale for 50p each at Hatt shop.

Intriguingly, councillor Creagh-Osborne said that he would have news about broadband services at the next Parish Council meeting. That's how to attract the crowds! Planning: nil With best wishes.

Knock, knock" "Who's there?" "Gordon" "Gordon who?" That's politics for you

Why such a weird headline? Few of us are old enough to remember this period in World War Two, when it seemed that Britain might be overwhelmed by Hitler's European victories. We all know that Germany and its allies were eventually defeated, but for those who lived with the real prospect of defeat and invasion, each day must have felt like the edge of a precipice.

War was formally declared in Britain in September 1939, but preparations to defend our allies in Europe had been in hand for some months. Later in 1939 a third of a million British, French and Belgian soldiers tried to halt the German advance across Europe towards France. However, in 1940 Hitler invaded Norway, Denmark, Holland and France, sweeping the allies before them. They retreated to the Belgian coast at Dunkirk and might have been annihilated but for a stubborn rearguard action and an amazing rescue mission by Naval and civilian vessels which ferried most of them to England. Hundreds of tanks and most heavy equipment had to be abandoned. The British Army was virtually defunct for many months, and the fear of invasion very real.

Later in 1940, Italy allied itself to Hitler, and France surrendered to the Nazis, leaving neutral Spain and Switzerland as the only major states in the European mainland not under enemy occupation. This was the time when Britain "stood alone". In the

Battle of Britain in the summer of 1940, German bombers and fighters attacked military targets in southern England, and took heavier losses than the defending Royal Air Force, as a result of which air control of the Channel remained in British hands. and Hitler therefore abandoned his plans to invade Britain. This may not have been immediately obvious to ordinary citizens, but the new Prime Minister Winston Churchill (since May 1940) marked this important victory with the now famous sentence "Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few".

By 1941, the Army had reequipped and was having successes in North Africa and the Middle East, Hitler attacked Russia and Japan attacked the USA, thus widening the War to global proportions and bringing powerful allies to Britain's side. The momentum towards allied victory now gathered pace, and although life in Britain still faced hardship and loss, the spectre of invasion and defeat began to fade. Locally, Plymouth's worst period of intensive bombing and widespread destruction in the city occurred in March and April 1941.

This is part of the background to the stories told in our booklet **Landulph at War**, which the Newsletter Group hope to distribute with the next edition of the Newsletter.

#### The School Memorial Clock

On Friday, 7 May Landulph Parish Projects Group and Landulph School held a Celebration Assembly to give a big 'thank you' to Mrs Pauline Rutherford and her family for looking after the War Memorial Clock so well over the past 87 years and to celebrate its refurbishment. In 1923, when the school was built, it also incorporated a Memorial Clock as a suggestion from Mrs. Rutherford's grandmother, Mrs Olive Prideaux, a teacher at the school. She suggested the clock as a memorial to those from Landulph Parish who had served in World War. For the next 48 years Mrs Rutherford's father Victor oiled. cleaned and wound the clock. When he retired Pauline took over and even when she retired from the School in 1994 she still continued to visit every six months to change the clock in line with British summer time, and even more often in recent years, as the clock started to go wrong and often had to be re-set. Fund raising began and with grants from Viridor, His Royal Highness the Duke of Cornwall and with donations from local parishioners, the £4,000 plus was raised for a new bell strike

controller, upgrade of the clock mechanism and refurbishment of the dial and hands. The clock will now re-set itself and no longer needs to be changed by hand.



Mrs Rutherford was presented with a bouquet of flowers from Sophie and Becky Gill, Sophie Congdon and Georgia Deacon whose grandfathers were all pupils at the school when the clock was last refurbished in the 50's. Mrs Rutherford gave a speech to the children showing them pictures of clocks which were special to her including a clock which her motherin-law Mrs Win Rutherford had when she was Postmaster at the old Post Office in Cargreen. The Assembly was attended by people from the parish including Les Clark who remembered the move from the old school to the new

The clock is the emblem of the School and is now looking very smart again, still in its original place at the entrance to the school building where it has stood for over 80 years. *Diane Gregory*
