Fortunately Mavis will continue to distribute newsletters in her area, and Reg will keep on thumping.

We would still welcome one or two **volunteers** to join the editorial group.

Landulph Parish Council

Meeting 17 October 2011

The Council welcomed Mrs Vanessa Greenaway as the new co-opted Parish Councillor.

The signage from the A388 into the village indicating 'single track road with passing places' was turned down by the Council as unlikely to be effective.

Cornwall Council which is 'grit bin' filling again this year were to be informed of the position of the three bins in the Parish.

The SW Ambulance Trust was to be contacted regarding the withdrawal of the remaining two First Responders following a complete lack of support from the Trust.

Investigation had revealed that many Parishioners are likely to have higher speed broadband by the end of this year.

The Chairman was to write a letter of congratulation to the organisers of the successful Landulph Festival.

The Environment Agency had requested use of the car park at Penyoke playing fields while the sea wall was renovated and they promised to return the field/car park to its original condition on completion of the works.

The bench at Elbridge bus stop was to be repaired.

The planning meeting that followed had no objections to applications at Long Orchard, Ham Quay, The Ranch and a local need house adjacent to The Beeches.

Meeting 21 November 2011

The main item agenda was to set the Parish precept for 2012-13. After considerable debate it was agreed that the precept would be **reduced**. It was noted the precept had been held in the current year to the previous years precept. So no increases since 2010 and now a reduction. This in spite of possible impositions that the Localism Bill may impose.

A letter from a Parishioner queried why dogs were not allowed into the cricket field now. This was to be investigated.

Complaints had been received about an unregulated business being carried out in the village. This was to be followed up.

There were no planning applications to consider but the success of recent applications and an appeal were commented upon.

My husband, our son Ethan (recently turned 3





News from Landulph School



The Cross Country Club is a very popular after school club and competes against other schools in our area over the autumn and spring terms.

The first event of the season was at Great Trethew. Unfortunately, not all the club members could compete as each of the four age grouped entries is limited to six participants from each school and still ends up with approximately 100 runners! We are delighted to report that Landulph won the team event against some much larger schools, which was an excellent achievement, and we also managed to field a team in the year 3/4 boys event. They finished a respectable 10th overall.

The second event took place at Lux Park and Landulph School once again performed very well in the year 3/4 girl's race. Special mention must be made of Bridie coming in 16th after recovering from a broken wrist and Charlotte who was running in her first ever cross country race and finished a very good 45th. The Landulph team won second prize.
