

Landulph Parish Council

Parish Council backs Spaniards move

Moves to have the Crooked Spaniards Inn listed as an Asset of Community Value were supported unanimously by the Parish Council at its meeting on 16 September. As reported elsewhere, an action group of parishioners is applying for the listing to give local residents time to raise a bid if the pub is put up for sale. Owing to a short time window, it was decided to leave the matter in the hands of The Society for the Preservation and Enhancement of the Crooked Spaniards and its Surrounding Conservation Area (SPECSSCA) Action demanded on potholes Following complaints by a number of parishioners during the public forum session, the Council agreed to approach the highways department (again!) to get action on the many deep and sometimes dangerous and damaging potholes in village roads and lanes. Particular hot spots for pots include Church Lane and Coombe Lane towards the Yacht Club. A list was given to our County Councillor, Daniel Pugh. Encouragingly, a member of the County Highways staff appeared in the village the following week and work is

promised.

You couldn't make it up!

Flooding has long been a problem in the road by the Landulph School playing field. A recent inspection of the drainpipe under the road by Mike Kitney revealed that a service utility pipe had been placed inside the storm drain taking up almost the entire diameter. Any solid matter in the run off could block it completely. It was reported that run-off from the Long Orchard industrial units was also causing problems. Daniel Pugh was asked to add these to the Highways work list.

Dull but important

A survey of the playing fields at Penyoke has revealed a number of problems which were gone through in detail. Councillors David Peck and Mac Armstrong agreed to look at the list and undertake the urgent work. Jane Espig volunteered to repaint the rocking horse. The council reviewed its standing orders in preparation to putting them on the new Parish Council website.

An outline proposal to build a house for a horticultural worker on land at Tamara was approved subject to a Horticultural tie.

Obituary - Captain James "Jim" Clouting

Jim died in August aged 85. Those who knew him will remember him with pleasure and admiration. Many in the parish will not know him for it is many years since he lived in Lane End Cottage, but Landulph was always close to his heart after his move to the outskirts of Callington.

Thanks to Jim the cricket field is now owned by the parish Council. He had a distinguished career as a Merchant Navy captain and while at sea he heard that the cricket field was to be sold (possibly as arable land) so promptly arranged through Roger Wratten to buy the field himself and thus secure its future for sport. In 2000 he donated the field to the parish with provisos that it be retained for public use and that it be named after the Searle family who had been among his closest friends.

As treasurer of the Cargreen Yacht Club, he was also a prime mover and guarantor in the Yacht Club's purchase of its present site. There are other more personal examples of Jim's generosity to individuals in distress, and it was typical of the man that the public were unaware of his actions.

We've written this note to acknowledge that Landulph is a better place because of Jim, and say our belated thanks.

Register now for EU elections

Cornwall Council is calling on local people to register now to make sure they can have their say and vote in the European Parliamentary elections taking place in May 2014. Electoral registration forms are being posted out on 1 October to all households in Cornwall and a new Electoral Register created. This list will then be used as the basis for the European Parliamentary elections in May 2014. The register will be published on 17 February 2014 and only people who are on the register will be able to vote. The forms contain the details of all the people who are currently registered to vote at that address. If none of the details on the form have changed, the householder can either sign the

form and return it in the pre-paid envelope provided or register electronically by: phone, on line or by text message. Registering electronically is the quickest, easiest and cheapest (for Cornwall) method. If any details on the form have changed it should be amended and returned by post or by hand to the Cornwall Council Offices or onestop shop. Cornwall asks that forms are returned as soon as they are received to avoid the costly necessity of sending out reminders. Providing the information on the form is required by law. Anyone who does not receive a form is asked to contact the Council's electoral registration team on

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
Another Burns' Night Celebration!

What next at the Spaniards?

The Crooked Spaniards Inn may be looking ever more derelict and moribund, but behind the scenes a lot has been happening. Since the last newsletter we have heard that the appeal by owners Sandra and Tony Arnold has been dismissed. However, this is not necessarily the end of the story.

What has happened Planning Inspector, Mike Fox rejected the appeal on 21 August. In a 23paragraph statement he emphasised the importance of the site within an AONB and Conservation area. He said any development required high standards of design. He concluded the proposals would be 'out of scale with the domestic and tight knit character and appearance of the Conservation area', and would not 'preserve or enhance the Conservation Area'. He described the development as 'inappropriate', 'alien' of 'excessive height', 'stark and unremitting'.

On the other hand he said the refurbishment of the pub would be 'a positive outcome' and did not reject the possibility of the site being developed sympathetically at a later stage. 'Some form of enabling development to the north of the pub is necessary for the scheme viability'.

What's happening now In preparation for any future proposals for the site, a group of more than 30 parishioners has formed a community action group called, rather clumsily, the Society for the Preservation and Enhancement of the Crooked Spaniards and its Surrounding Conservation Area (SPECSSCA). Contact Janet Stone immediate purpose of this group is to get the site listed as an Asset of Community Value (ACV). The

principle advantage of this is that, should the pub come up for sale,

completion can be postponed for six months to allow time for the group to put together a bid of their own from their own, or other resources. However, the listing does not compel the owners to sell to any such group. At its September meeting the Parish Council gave its support to the group.



Chairman Gerry Stephenson commented, 'This may help to get the pub reopened which is what most of us want'.

What will happen next SPECCSCA is making preparations to get the site listed as an ACV at the beginning of October. The inspector's report allowed room for the Arnolds to put together an application for a more sympathetic, smaller and lower development and it is anticipated that this may appear before too long. What is certain is that the sadly deserted building will remain closed for the foreseeable future.
