Landulph Parish Council

Landulph Parish Council Meeting Annual Meeting and Parish Council Planning Meeting 16 April 2012 Parish Council Meeting

A long evening covered a commonthly meetina. annual bined meeting and planning meeting.

In brief the monthly meeting covered: the process of liberating the old youth club money for the children of the parish; playing field inspections; lack of recycling bags/bins; Saltash Hoppa Bus; Funds for celebratory Jubilee mugs for local children to mark the Queen's Jubilee; bins: Cornwall full dog 000 Town/Parish code of conduct.

Since the report of the last meeting, highlighting problems between vehicle drivers and horse riders, a member of the public had come forward to liaise between the various horse riding groups. A meeting will hopefully be arranged between all parties. The Chairman commented on the perils of riding our lanes and the difficulties that motorists might have in anticipating how a horse might behave.

The Annual Meeting

The Chairman's report praised the community goodwill in the Parish as evidenced by the formation of the Kidz youth club, litter removal, elderly residents being looked out for, playing field equipment repaired, and all the Organisations that give such variety.

He drew attention to a recent Community Network Association meeting where the Cornwall Citizen Advice Bureau (CAB) Manager gave a grave overview of the financial state of so many residents of Cornwall, especially SE Cornwall which he cited as being the part with the most problems.

The Chairman asked that the Parish Council be allowed to contribute to the CAB. The Annual Meeting allows parishioners to vote and a vast majority voted in favour. **Planning Meeting**

The unusually well-attended public form before this meeting was extended beyond its normal length.

The Crooked Spaniards Inn development. The last application's reasons for refusal were considered in the light of the new application. The process that the applicants had been advised to follow by the Cornwall Planning Department was discussed. The specific parameters that the Parish Council can consider were debated. This was not helped by the recent passing of the Localism Bill and the fact that Planning Policy Guidance of the old District Council may have been superseded by the overarching presumption of allowing sustainable development.

The meeting voted by a majority to support the application with caveats added to include; a section

106 on the inn for its continued use as a licensed house: a PROW modification order is made in consultation with the parish footpath group; the public house is completed prior to any houses being occupied; the council expressed concern at the height of the property and that any modification by building regulations does not increase the height above ordnance datum: the council wished to see clarity on boat trailer storage; the council seek assurance that the proposals comply with the saved Caradon policies on tourism development in an AONB.

Grove Villa, Landulph: Supportfor the replacement dwelling with caveats: the mobile home is removed following completion of the house; the footpath remains open during the works with unrestricted access being preserved to the residence of Trevevans during the works.

Landulph Parish Council Meeting 21 May

An unnamed lady has emptied the dog poo bins and replaced the bin liners. She is not a dog owner. There are some wonderful people in this village.

More excellent souls have contributed to Jubilee mugs for the children of the Parish. A majority of the Council agreed to fund the slight shortfall from parish funds.

The RoSPA playing field inspection revealed faults that had also been picked up very recently after a council inspection. These will be corrected. The playing surface wear is to be addressed in conjunction with the users.

It was reported that a local livery stable owner had bought High Vis Jackets for all his riders to wear.

A member of the public highlighted road surface problems at N Wayton. Action is to be taken.

A planning application was approved and the receipt of 2 emails about the Spaniards application was noted.

Crooked Spaniard Plans Attacked at Public Forum

Around 60 people packed the Landulph Memorial Hall Annexe before the Parish Meeting on 16 April. Feelings ran high with a number of people arguing strongly against the proposals. Among the objections were its scale and design, the viability of the scheme, inadequate parking provision, concern for the footpath and flood risk.

Despite the the overwhelming majority of speakers talking against the plans, the Council supported them, subject to conditions, by four votes to three.

The Cornwall Council Planning site subsequently registered 149 comments on the application, of which 118 were objections.


We understand that, from July, there will be two Eucharists and one service of the Word within our current Benefice each Sunday.

The Queen Visits Landulph

In this Diamond Jubilee year some residents will recall the visit by the Queen and Prince Philip to Landulph on 25 July 1962.

The visit was part of a three day tour of the West Country and the Royal Train rolled into Saltash Station in the morning to be greeted by local dignitaries. From here the Royal party was taken by car on a tour of Duchy of Cornwall Farms and Estates.

The Queen visited Landulph Farm, the Home of Mr and Mrs Kellock Roberts and met the 22 tenants of the Manor of Landulph. The farm was principally devoted to dairying with a herd of 30 Friesian and South Devons along with 50 breeding ewes and 700 hens. The Queen was particularly interested in the cattle as Mr Roberts could tell them apart by their faces. She commented that she was also able to do this with their own cattle although her husband (Prince Philip) could not. They were also shown the modern milking parlour, which was one of the first of its type to be introduced to Cornwall in 1960.

In the farmhouse kitchen Mrs Eileen Roberts proudly pointed out her new sink unit, to which the Queen asked "where's the washing machine?" and laughed when Mrs Roberts replied 'l'm it!'

At Landulph Church the bells were ringing out to welcome the Royal Guests who were met by Rev G Lummis, Church Wardens Mr F Hosking and Mr W Blatchford and Mr H Clark Captain of the Ringers.

At the Church were also the choir, Parochial Church Council and children from Landulph School. The Rev Lummis pointed out features of the Church which were of historical interest and Prince Philip was very interested in the Paleologus Memorial and its connection to the Byzantine Emperors.

Amongst the bellringers the Queen had a special word with Mr George Searle, whom she noticed was wearing the Coronation Medal.

After signing the church visitors book the Royal Party left Landulph to continue their tour,heading for farms at Smeaton & Leigh, Pillaton. *Andrew Barrett*

Ancient Trees of Cornwall - Volunteer Training Days at Pentillie

If you enjoy walking, and love trees, you may like to help in the Ancient Tree Hunt - a nationwide project that, for the first time, aims to discover, record and map the ancient, veteran and notable trees across the UK. Cornwall Ancient Tree Forum has been recording trees in this county for 4 years, but there are still more to discover. We are looking for more people to get involved, and if there is sufficient interest, will offer training sessions at Pentillie, where successful recording trips have already been held. Once you know how to measure and record features of Ancient Trees you can put your own discoveries on the interactive Ancient Tree Hunt website.

Although Cornwall is one of the least wooded counties in the UK, it could still be rich in ancient and significant trees. The oldest tree discovered so far is the Darley Oak near Upton Cross which clocks in at around 900 years old! These fine old trees have survived because methods of land management have not changed much over the years. A Milky Way in Landulph

The last two editions described strawberry growing in the parish, and in what may become a series of related notes, here's some facts about milk production which might surprise you. At Marsh Farm, where the Best family have been Duchy tenants for about 55 years, there is now a dairy herd of 400 cows which produce on average 9500 litres of milk each per year, a total of 3.8 million litres. (An Olympic swimming pool holds 2.5 million litres) The entire production is bought by Dairy Crest and taken to the Davidstow Creamery to contribute to the famous Cornish cheeses. Malcolm and Jane, assisted by son Richard and herdsman Robert Legg, use modern technology to help assure high quality milk production. For example, each milking cow is permanently electronically tagged, so that when it enters a milking booth it is recognised, and receives an individualised amount of feed supplement. Once the milking cluster is attached by hand to the udders, the process then runs itself with the cluster detaching when the milk flow runs out, the teats and the cluster being automatically sprayed with disinfectant and the cluster retracted out of the way of any soiling, ready for the next animal. This happens twice a day, taking 4 hours to milk the whole herd. The animals are kept indoors during winter, in individual stalls floored with a rubber-chip filled mattress on top of which sea sand in spread to keep the



animals clean. Apparently a resting cow produces more milk that one outdoors on the move, but in summer the doors are opened to allow the cows to graze the fields if they want to.

The farm grows all its own silage (about 7000 tons annually), uses all its slurry as fertiliser, breeds its own Holstein replacement animals and has had no problem with bovine TB for many years. The family is rightly proud of its modern operation and enjoyed describing it to a "towny". We're too polite to tell you how the electronic tags tell the farmer when a cow is in its fertile period... *Morton Macleod*
