

#### Parish Council – September

Plans to create a small, new area of woodland – a copse, perhaps – have been presented to the Council. An unused area of the cricket ground is favoured but the proposals are still in the early discussion stage. There might also be some planting on the Recreation Ground

Amanda Pugh, the Parish Tree Warden, reported that the Woodlands Trust is offering free tree packs and she has suggested the cricket field. The field is owned by the Council but rented to the Cricket Club, which would be consulted. Any planting would be well clear of the boundaries. The proximity of overhead power lines would also have to be considered. The trees would be selected from native species. Councillors, who were broadly in favour of the idea, hoped that indigenous oak would feature prominently. The project also has the support of local County Councillor, Jesse Foot.

In other business, the question of trespass featured prominently. Public access to the private slipway at the bottom of Fore Street has been a contentious issue for many decades. It has now been suggested that a gate at the top of the slip would deter unauthorised access. The key issue is that, although the slipway is privately owned, there is a 2.5m wide right of way over it which allows people on foot to access the water. Any gateway would have to remain unlocked to retain the footpath and could also obstruct access by emergency services.

Councillor Butcher raised the subject of general trespass in connection with dog walking in the fields around Landulph. He encouraged walkers to stick to the footpaths and to clean up after their dogs.

No Parish Council meeting would be complete without a discussion of dog poo and this was no exception. It was reported that dog bins near the church and in Coombe Lane needed replacing; it was also questioned whether the new bin at the bottom of Fore Street would be emptied often enough and who would foot the bill. And finally, did you know that Cornwall Council offers training in dealing with dog fouling. You will be relieved to hear your councillors and Parish Clerk are qualified to deal with dog owners in person.

The Council has asked the Newsletter to carry details of the website, www.what3words.com. Apparently the app allocates a three-word code to each 3m2 in the country – why? To make it easier for emergency services to identify accurately locations in remote rural regions. Visit the site to find out more. Job done!

The Council has allocated more money from the solar park fund. £400 has been given for recording the parish's oral tradition. Requests for money for street signs, regular coffee mornings and further funding for the Under 5s were turned down. It was suggested that the Under 5s might benefit from alternative funding or an allocation from the Parish's ring-fenced Youth Club Fund.

Finally, the Council expressed its thanks to Morton McLeod, the Newsletter's retiring chief political correspondent and composer of witty, erudite and wonderfully readable council reports. A new council sketch writer is waiting in the wings.

#### History of the new cross at Landulph Church

In 1977 a cross was given to the Methodist church at Landulph by Ida Greenwood Hosking in memory of Mr and Mrs Ernest Talbot who lived at Southwark in Cargreen. In those early days Ernest was a taxi driver and market gardener. Ida Hosking who was my father's step sister worked for the Talbots and was also housekeeper. They all attended the Methodist church where Mrs Talbot was then organist. Sadly, when Mr and Mrs Talbot passed away, Ida wanted to give something to the chapel in their memory and came up with the idea of the wooden cross. The cross was made in Cargreen by local carpenter Brian Martin who was son-in-law to Bill Blatchford, of Brooks Hayes Cargreen, and long term Churchwarden, with my father Frederick Hosking at Landulph church. When the Methodist church closed it was a wonderful gesture of our friends there to donate the cross to take pride of place at Landulph church. For this we are truly grateful.

#### Landulph Memorial Hall – Mission Statement

At September's Landulph Memorial Hall committee meeting, Chairman John Wright quoted from its original constitution which dates from 1951. The document confirmed the conveyance of land and its purpose, well before funding and design had been agreed. I was struck by the dignity and scope of the 'founding fathers' vision of the future of the new village hall, and with John's permission reproduce this opening paragraph: *The property hereby conveyed (herein called "the trust property") shall be held upon trust for the purposes of physical and mental training and recreation and social, moral and intellectual development through the medium of a Village Hall, reading and recreation rooms, library, lectures, classes, recreations and entertainments or otherwise as may be found expedient for the benefit of the inhabitants of the Parish of Landulph in the County of Cornwall and its immediate vicinity without distinction of sex or of political, religious or other opinions subject to the provisions of these presents.* 

That was 1951, just 6 years after the World War ended. The country looked to a bright new future and in South East Cornwall the opening of the Tamar Bridge in 1961 opened up a new area to Plymouth's wealth and employment. It took 19 years for 1951's ambition to become reality

but on 19<sup>th</sup> September 1970 the new Landulph Memorial Hall was opened and has served the community well ever since. Until then, the little Rectory Room had been the main community centre and is remembered with affection by many of Landulph's senior residents. *Morton McLeod*


