Parish Council - Monday 16 December

From the outset this promised to be a quick affair given that members of Cornwall Council Planning Department were a 'no show' and that food and drink were laid out ready for all to partake at the close. Although there was little of note in the public forums, our Councillors considered various matters as diverse as to how a new sewage treatment plant on a planning application before them would be emptied, to the Council's finances and the sale of pasties in the parish. When it comes to finances, it would appear that the Council has a major dilemma. On the one hand it is encouraged/instructed to earmark and reserve funds, but on the other it is not allowed to spend said funds. At last month's meeting the Council spent its annual quota of s137 money (it allows councils to unlock reserve funds to incur expenditure for purposes not otherwise authorised). This means that it may now not be in a position to meet its obligations to pay for matters like the cost of maintaining the non-ecumenical part of Landulph's cemetery. The Clerk is to seek urgent clarification.

If you see the Councillors wearing tin hats on 1 April next year, it's not an April fools joke, more an attempt to protect their heads now that they have voted through a 34% increase to the precept. Perhaps we need more housing to spread the cost!

However, on a serious note, the Council is expecting future costs to increase thanks to Localism and Climate Change initiatives. To put it into context, a Band D property can expect to pay an additional £1.38 per month.

On a happy note, our access to local pasties should be secure as the Council approved to renew Helluva Pasties' licence. Apparently the Councillors don't buy pasties so there was no conflict of interest!

Monday 20 January

The second report has to be submitted within hours of the meeting to ensure strict publishing deadlines are met. Ordinarily this can cause havoc to the old creative and editing juices. However, this month there was a thin agenda and there was little to note in the public forums. The Council agreed to go back to Cornwall Council's Planners to see whether or not they will meet the public after their private meeting with our Councillors next month.

Following last month's meeting, the Clerk received clarification as to how the Council can spend its money and it was resolved that from the new financial year a more rigorous 'grant application' process will be put in place. The Councillors then got bogged down at item 13 on the agenda, the recurring banana skin that is data protection. Your scribe's 'will to live' was restored when it became apparent that the Council are going to start eviction procedures to the abandoned white van on The Coombe.

Finally, the Council was given the disturbing news that the Memorial Hall had been damaged yet again following a teenagers' party at the weekend. *Marc Shirlaw*

Lanes. This extends the existing 20mph restrictions around the school. Anyone who walks our lanes, particularly the serpentine section from the Methodist Chapel to the Cross, will know the perils of cars appearing round blind bends at speed. This route is particularly dangerous for young families on the way to or from school in the early morning and afternoon. Horses and their riders are also a vulnerable group. Martin Worth, Council Chairman, who campaigned for the lower and extended limit, commented 'This makes it safer for all the children and adults in our community as pedestrians, riders and road users. It also improves accident survival and injury rates for all and encourages us to pay more attention to our travel, whilst being more aware of others on the road'.

Martin concluded that, if people were worried about driving standards in the parish they should follow police advice and fit dash-cams front and rear and GPS. This can then be used as evidence in any police action. *James Jermain*

Landulph Church News

Landulph Church had a great Christmas - thank you for being there. Through a dramatic, candle-lit Advent service, the carol service with guest turns by the Cargreen Village Choir and Cornish Jam, Messy Christmas (a turbo-charged Sunday school), attended by quite a lot of children and families, to a midnight Communion on Christmas Eve, we celebrated Christmas, with your help.

Tower roof work underway After much hard work and fund-raising, work began on the tower roof before Christmas. Although the main roof was repaired nearly twenty years ago, the tower roof needed work and was letting in water. The project has taken longer than expected due to terrible weather conditions. The tower roof is now covered with lead again and Heritage Cornwall is working to complete the flashings. It has started the work on the stair turret.

The total project cost is over $\pounds 60,000$, raised by a number of generous donations (one donor alone gave over $\pounds 25,000$), and grants. Thank you



to those who worked so hard applying for the grants. We were also touched by the number of donations which continue to arrive. There is still more money required so if you meant to help, it's not too late. There will also be other work needed which is less urgent than the roof, and we'd like to undertake those to secure the building for future generations.

Services In addition to a monthly Communion service and either Morning Praise or Family Service, we look forward to other services over Lent and Easter - please look out for these on www.thetamar7.org - and we plan more community events. The church is committed to supporting the work of the RABI (Royal Agricultural Benevolent Institution, rabi.org.uk) for the foreseeable future. The charity offers support to the farming community in difficulty.

For those who are interested in faith but don't feel ready for church yet, we have an informal group which meets monthly to talk about faith and is open to all.

Life Saving Automatic Defibrillators

There are two defifillators located within our parish, both for public use in an emergency.

- 1. Landulph Memorial Hall in Fore Street
- 2. Cargreen Yacht Club, Coombe Lane.

Landulph Memorial Hall defibrillator:

Located adjacent to front doors

To use you are required to input the code 1111 to unlock and press the green 'tick' button to open for access.

Cargreen Yacht Club defibrillator

Located on the front wall of the building before you reach the front doors. This unit is left unlocked, and so no unlock code is required

Please remember in the event that you may need to use one of the above units, that in a cardiac arrest situation, **continuous CPR is essential while someone else goes to obtain the defibrillator.**
