Landulph in lockdown

Following the presentation regarding COVID-19 at the Parish Council meeting on 16th March, and the Government's latest policy as of 24 March, the Parish Council is anxious to do whatever it can to help parishioners at this extraordinary and difficult time.

With the current advice to self-isolate, the Parish needs to work together to help our senior and vulnerable parishioners through what may be a protracted period of time. Disregard of Government advice, panic buying, abuse of retail workers and hateful social media posts - these are all very sad symptoms of the current situation.

We all should and must try to spread positivity and kindness through these difficult times. Anxiety is high and we must all think how our words may affect someone coping with the pressure of a sick relative, a key job, or isolation.

After all this is over, all that really matters is how we treat each other. **The Parish Council** is being proactive in trying to ensure that everyone gets the critical help they may need. There is ongoing advice via *Landulph Innit* Facebook Page. We have set up a Parish WhatsApp Group for instant messaging to 50+ Community Volunteers who are able to support the Landulph Parish Community.

Furthermore, we are distributing #ViralKindness cards (included in this Newsletter) to all residents to enable those who don't have Internet access a way to get in touch. For your reference, to access help directly, contact Martin Worth (Chairman) <u>07949 208055</u> or Roger Pugh (Co-ordinator) <u>07753 719483</u>. There are more details elsewhere in the Newsletter.

We urge all of you to look out for your neighbours. Please take every precaution and wash your hands regularly to ensure you are spreading only kindness. Keep up to date with the latest government guidelines and avoid physical and close contact (two metres distance apart). With this in mind, please note that the play equipment at Penyoke Recreation

Ground has been closed and is now out of bounds to everyone - parents please ensure that your children are aware of this. The field next to it remains open.

Landulph Parish Council will continue to keep its meeting dates scheduled into the diary. Closer to each meeting date the Parish Council will decide whether a meeting is required, and how that meeting will take place, following the latest Government guidance in relation to the COVID-19 emergency. Landulph Church is closed and will remain so until further notice **Pentille Castle** and grounds are both now closed despite efforts to keep the gardens accessible for the public. All public events are cancelled until at least the end of June. 'Jimmy Tilly is holding the fort...'

Landulph Memorial Hall is closed until further notice.

Gardening Club is closed – see further information in this Newsletter **The Cargreen Yacht Club** clubhouse is closed but the grounds remain accessible for dinghy launching and walkers (subject to government guidelines on social separating).

Corona Virus and Your Pets: Our resident Veterinary Advisor,

Sue Hassan writes:

There is no evidence that your pets can be infected by the COVID-19 virus. Many of you will have heard about the dog in Hong Kong that tested

positive for the human Corona virus. This dog was shown to have virus particles on it but did not show any signs of an immune response to it; it did not have an active infection but is believed to be acting as an environmental vector ie the infected owner had been touching the dog and passed virus particles on to it. It was human to animal transmission, not vice-versa.

If people were to handle the dog there is a theoretical risk that they could then acquire the infection. All pets belonging to symptomatic owners can, in theory, act as vector in the same way as a door handle, computer keyboard, etc would. There is no evidence that dogs play a role in the spread of this human disease or that they become sick.

Many animals get infections caused by other specific varieties of Corona virus. These species-specific viruses do not affect people. For example, Canine Coronavirus causes diarrhoea in dogs; Feline Coronavirus causes peritonitis and wasting in cats.

If your pet is sick, and anyone in the household is either displaying symptoms or self-isolating, phone your vet. Do not go to the practice until you have spoken to them. If feasible, allow someone else to transport your pet to the vets. Your vet may ask them to wait in the car until they are ready to see the pet. The vet and nurse dealing with the pet from a COV-ID-19 infected household will wear gloves and an apron and may wipe down your pet before examining it.

Parish Council: Monday 17 February

A larger than normal number of the public attended this meeting in anticipation of finding out what the Planners deem to be permissible, or not, in our village and its environs. The gathering was told that our Councillors had had a constructive meeting where five of their questions, presumably one per Councillor present, and five from Parishioners had been raised. The minutes of the meeting were subsequently published some days later for all to see. Our Cornwall Councillor, Jesse Foot, reminded us that he is always on hand should a Planning Applicant feel aggrieved about a specific matter.

Our Councillors turned their attention to a myriad of items including the imminent removal of the white van from The Coombe, the planting of 12 trees on an unused corner of the cricket ground and the oral history project. In addition to these, the following were particularly note worthy: The discussions regarding the book exchange and the fact that the name of the volunteer who renovated it last time could not be uttered for fear of a breach of GDPR and the discussions regarding whether or not the soon to be installed dog poo bin at the Church should include the image of a dog. In the last year we have seen the white lines on the A388 extended and a 20mph limit be imposed throughout the village. The next round of funding is now open and Parishioners are encouraged to submit their ideas as to how road safety can be improved. An early contender is the suggestion of a footpath between the Memorial Cross and Hall to facilitate safer pedestrian movements.

Parish Council: Monday 16 March

In an attempt to get ahead of the curve, I started to draft this report some days before the event given that, as a rule, nothing happens. Indeed, it has rained non-stop since the last meeting; the white van has still to be removed from The Coombe and we didn't really learn anything new from the meeting between our Councillors and the planners. Oh! How wrong I was!

A packed Memorial Hall (well 21 people sitting 2 metres apart) watched history being made when the Covid-19 meeting was recorded and streamed live online. The pace of the epidemic is such that by the time you read this, the good advice given may well be out of date. The Council meeting that followed was nearly over before it started as one Councillor stated that it contravened new Government guidelines.

However, the meeting did go ahead but was done and dusted within half an hour. The Council agreed to create a plan to co-ordinate its response to Covid-19. A statement is included in this Newsletter.

Although subsequent meetings are as scheduled, it is unlikely that they will actually take place as it is envisaged that our Councillors will conduct business without physically meeting for the foreseeable future. So this may well be my last report for some time

Church roof re-leading complete

This stage of the refurbishment of the tower has come in on time and under budget. When the weather improves, the main roof gutters will be cleaned out, which will enable the redecorating work inside, between the belfry and font, to begin.

We are pleased to report that considerable savings have been made from the original estimates of this project. We were able to renegotiate the cost of the scaffolding and base enclosure. A rebate was claimed on the scrap value of the lead removed, as it was found to be 5mm thick.

A parishioner has volunteered to make a new door on to the tower roof from the spiral staircase.

In order to allow for unforeseen circumstances, the tower committee had set aside a contingency sum. Thankfully the roof timbers were found to be sound, saving a further good sum of money.

Grateful thanks must be extended to Nigel Cummings and Rob Leverton, who were co-opted on to the tower committee, their building and business knowledge has proved invaluable.

Thanks to all who donated and supported fund-raising events. Thanks must also go to Margaret and Glenn Honey for their tireless work on securing grant funds.

The next projects will be updating the aging heating system, improving the toilet facilities.

By this time the boat was about four feet away from the pontoon and I decided to jump! It was an incredible struggle, but I managed to haul myself unceremoniously over the guard rail, pulling all my muscles in the process - I made it!

'I could not believe my good fortune. I glanced ashore to see a glimmer of disappointment on the faces of passers-by that I had narrowly avoided a good soaking! I gathered my decorum, set about repeating the process and went around again, this time making doubly sure the mooring line was firmly attached to the boat!

Landulph Festival donates £6,400

At its AGM in March, the Landulph Festival Committee announced it had donated over £6,400 to local clubs and organisations. The Acting Treasurer, Morton McLeod, said last year's income was swelled significantly by the 'Two Johns' concerts and the Panto.

This has enabled the committee to make donations of £4,300 in the previous year and a further £2,153 post year-end.

Organisations who have benefited include: The Church for repairs to the tower; The School for outdoor play equipment; The Under 5s group; The CYC cadets and the Newsletter. A new constitution was adopted to bring the Association into line with GDPR and Internet banking requirements. The committee was re-elected en bloc with the addition of Martin Worth. The formal business of the meeting was completed in record time so that we could turn our attention to the important matter of the evening, the veritable feast laid out before us. Full details of proposals for this Autumn's Festival are on the organisation's website. The Newsletter will also give details of upcoming events nearer the time.

CYC Closed

John Davis, Commodore of the Cargreen Yacht Club, has announced that the Clubhouse and bar will be closed until further notice. Cadet activities have also been suspended until further notice. The Club's grounds and dinghy parks remain accessible and members can launch and recover dinghies from the slip and causeway but are asked to follow the Government's social separation rules.

Yacht owners who are making plans for the season should visit the Royal Yachting Association website (www.rya.org.uk) for guidance on visiting British and overseas harbours. The Government has warned that British yachtsmen arriving in European ports may be asked to self-isolate for 14 days. Some UK ports are already imposing this restriction on yachts arriving from outside the UK and it is possible some ports and harbours may be closed completely.

- 1. Landulph Memorial Hall in Fore Street
- 2. Cargreen Yacht Club, Coombe Lane.

Landulph Memorial Hall defibrillator:

Located adjacent to front doors

To use you are required to input the code 1111 to unlock and press the green 'tick' button to open for access.

Cargreen Yacht Club defibrillator

Located on the front wall of the building before you reach the front doors. This unit is left unlocked, and so no unlock code is required

Please remember in the event that you may need to use one of the above units, that in a cardiac arrest situation, **continuous CPR is essential while someone else goes to obtain the defirillator.**
