Parish Council 23 April and 5 May

Given that there were four parish council meetings in the last cycle, you might have expected there to be nothing to talk about. However, the agenda for the 23 April meeting was surprisingly full, and spilled out into the extra meeting on 5 May. There were a few 'other matters', but the bulk of the discussion was on planning issues. 'Other matters' started with an agreement to write to HM Queen Elizabeth giving the parish's condolences on the death of Prince Phillip. The letter would reminisce about the royal visit to the parish in 1962. Phillip showed great interest in the tomb of the last Christian emperor of Greece – probably his 28-times great uncle! The Recreation Ground barrier by the car park has been fixed. The next safety assessment is due in June, but Councillor Braund noted that the swings creak. The Chair noted that he regularly received compliments on the facilities.

The Holme oak at North Wayton had been felled, but a slice of the trunk had been saved and donated to the school as a teaching aid. The tall pines at the back of the school field were becoming a concern, because of falling cones and mess from the large crow population. A working group was required to update the footpaths booklet, and Morton Macleod and the Butchers had offered help with Marcia Pirie updating illustrations. The Butchers had met two of the elusive crab tilers during a walk around Neale Point. There were two 'patches' of tiles, one from Weir Point to Parsons Quay and the other from Parsons Quay to Kingsmill. The first of these was checked three and four times a year, but the second was checked weekly. All crabs taken were for 'personal' use.

Climate Change Committee: The Terms of Reference and Constitution of this Council sub-group were approved. The group reported that Cornwall currently has just 17 rapid charging points for electric cars though this should increase to 150 soon. It costs twice as much to use a rapid charger as it does to do it at home, but grants are available to install points. 25% to 35% of homes in Cornwall are unsuitable for the installation of home charging points, so public points remain important. Discussions about points at the Memorial Hall are ongoing.

Planning The Council resolved to support the retention of a 'local worker' restriction on a house in the parish. The condition required the occupant to do 25 days' work a year in or near the parish. It had been argued that the restriction was no longer relevant. The Affordable Housing Team had advised against removal.

For the plans to build nine houses at the top of Coombe Drive, only three councillors were left once those with a declared interest had



left. This was noted as the largest application received for years. Changes had been made following earlier criticisms, but the council was concerned about the overall impact of the development, and it was not in keeping with the village. The vote was two against with one abstention.

With a pre-application advice for plans to build houses to the North of Coombe Drive, and the pending appeal on the development at Rosehill Nurseries, the cumulative effect of the rash of large building applications was becoming a serious concern. The Rosehill appeal might give insight into the need (or lack of need) for affordable housing in the area. STOP PRESS: The Rosehill Nursery appeal has been turned down.

Coming under Planning but not actually a planning application was the Marine Management Organisation's consultation process for the Yacht Club's refurbishment of the causeway. Twenty lorry loads of local stone were needed, spread along the causeway to return its height to 6 inches above the mud. This was accepted without comments. **By the time you read this**, the local elections will be history. Councillors Butcher, Craddick and Holmes have stood down. The

other five, Councillors Gaye Braund, Peter Braund, Martin Worth, Marilyn Dennis and Libby Gawith were elected uncontested. Thanks were given to the three departing councillors, as well as Cornwall Councillors Sam Tamlin and Jesse Foot who both attended the meeting. Councillor Butcher thanked Councillor Worth for his efforts as Chair during the current council.

The Chair finally noted that a Cargreen village celebration was planned on 10 July. This would be held at the Yacht Club so that there would be access to toilets!

Parish Council 17 May

There has been a legal decision that, after 10 May, any council meeting requiring a vote must be open and visible. There is a legal challenge to this, since Zoom has been such a success. However a formal move to on-line meetings poses some interesting and detailed technical challenges. Whatever, the new Landulph Parish Council held its first formal meeting face-to-face under the Yacht Club awning on 17 May, making the most of the early evening sun.



The meeting was actually two in one. First was the Annual Parish Assembly, with five councillors, one clerk and five members of the public present. The Chair reported very positive achievements over the last two years, including increased planning scrutiny, IT developments, a focus on the Under-5s group and recreation around, the creation of the Landulph Climate Action Working Group and development of the Emergency Plan. The community response to the Covid-19 situation had been outstanding, and had been supplemented by an important but much less visible medical support group. Finally the incredible response to the Community Broadband initiative had left OpenReach open mouthed! The Public were obviously

impressed and there were no questions in the Public Forum, so the meeting closed early and turned itself into the Annual Meeting of Landulph Parish Council.

This started with a query from a member of the public about the recording of a planning decision at the last meeting. The approval of the minutes therefore took longer than expected, and resulted in a decision for the Clerk to review the comments and take further advice. Councillor Worth was re-elected as Chair. The Council then agreed that tradition should be respected, and the newest councillor should be appointed as Vice-Chair. A meteoric rise to power for Councillor Gawith! However, the appointment of members to sub-committees was postponed until the remaining two council places could be filled. Landulph Parish Day; The council voted to provide funds for the entertainment throughout the day at the event, 10 July. The funds will come from the donation to the village from the Dawn French filming a couple of years ago. Councillors thought it important to emphasise that the event was inclusive for all parishioners, and not just for those at the Yacht Club where it will be held.

There was more discussion about the process for co-option of additional members for the PC. Most importantly, a call for people to apply was needed, and would be published on noticeboards, on social media and in this Newsletter (see p14). By this point the public was getting cold, so the

meetings finished after just $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

Martin Worth – County Councillor

Landulph Parish Council Chairman, Martin Worth (Conservative), became a Cornwall County Councillor in the recent elections. The Conservatives now have overall control of Cornwall and Martin was immediately appointed Deputy Cabinet Councillor for Transport. He will continue as Chairman of the Parish Council, having been re-elected at the recent Annual Meeting. In addition to transport, Martin will be taking an active interest in business and technology policy.

Big jump in Parish precept

The Parish precept – the part of your rates bill that goes to the parish, has increased by nearly 50 per cent this year. This is considerably more than previous years and far higher that other local parishes. However, it must be remembered that the Parish precept is only a very small part of home owners' overall rates bill.

The headline figure has risen to £24,957 from £16,642, an increase of £8,314. The main reason for the rise has been a big increase in the provision for the cost of repairs to the playground (from £1,794 to £4,500) and the money allocated to the fund for the eventual replacement of the playground (from £1,861 to £3,000). More money has also been set aside to fund community projects (from £1,500 to

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The increase means a Band D property will pay a precept of £36.41 this year compared to £16.60 last year. Full details of the precept are available on the Parish Council website <u>www.landulph.org</u>. Look for Reports, Policies and Documents.

Landulph Under Fives

We also looked after some chicken eggs for the day and were so excited when one hatched!

We are a small setting where children get lots of attention and plenty of opportunities to forge friendships and prepare for their journey to primary school. We would like to say a massive thank you to Claire Lakin and Chris Loveday for all their support recently. Chris has been busy painting the fence and sprucing up the outside area. Claire has been integral to the bags to school collection. She also arranged a Facebook and a tabletop sale and has so far raised £456 for the pre-school.

Our bags to school collection, in partnership with Landulph School PTA, was particularly successful this time. We estimated that we collected over 200 bags between us and raised £333 in total for 1,110kg of clothing etc! Thank you to each and every person who promoted, donated and supported our Bags to School collection. These fundraisers are vital to our sustainability.

Landulph School

We are starting on the road to recovery now and are planning some events for the children later in the year.

The photograph is of a narcissus called Cargreen which I was pleased to arow for the first time this vear. It had been bred in Northern Ireland but our own daffodil breeder Dan Du Plessis of Lower Marsh Farm was permitted to name and register it in 1993. Dan's descendants (the Scamp family) continue their interest in narcissi, and their bulb catalogue from Quality Daffodils makes interesting reading. It includes other local names (Lynher, Bishop of St Germans. Tamar Fire and

Cotehele), plus some historical varieties dating back to the 17th Century.

Becoming a member of the Council puts you at the heart of Landulph life and gives you an opportunity to make a difference to your local community. It is also the gateway to a number of other organisations or working parties in which the Parish is represented including road safety, footpaths, playground, climate change and emergency planning.

The two prospective Councillors would become co-opted members of the Council. To qualify for co-option a prospective Councillor must satisfy one of the following criteria:

- Be registered as a local government elector for the parish
- Have occupied, in the last 12 months, as owner or tenant, land or premises in the Parish
- Have had their only or principal place of work in the Parish for the last year
- Have, during the whole of the last 12 months, resided within the Parish or within three miles of it.

The applicant must not be debarred from standing as a Councillor. Applicants will be invited to the Parish Council meeting on 21 June. 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A running tap uses between 6 to 9 litres of water a minute

Water Saving Tips:

- Fill a jug with water & keep it in the fridge
- Turn off the tap when cleaning your teeth
- · Install water saving shower heads or flow restrictors
- Take a shower of $\tilde{\mathbf{5}}$ minutes or less and turn the water off when soaping
- Install a water saving toilet flush system readily available
- Only run the dishwasher when its fully loaded & avoid rinsing dirty dishes
- Don't leave the tap running when you clean or peel vegetables
- Use a multi-level steamer to cook vegetables
- Fix a dripping tap a dripping tap can waste 15 litres per day or 5,500 litres of water a year!
- Install an instant water heater near your kitchen sink so you don't have to run off the water waiting for it to heat up (saves on energy costs too)
- Mulch your plants, and only water in early morning or early evening to reduce evaporation.
- Monitor your water bill check for leakage inside & outside of property if your usage is higher than normal

Use a Water Butt

Water is expensive and while we are blessed with lot of it, it makes sense to capture the water we do have to use in periods of dry weather. Water butts are ideal as they capture water directly from your roof. According to Waterwise an amazing 85,000 litres of rain falls

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Memories of another lock-down

20 years ago, as part of a project, I started a Parish nature diary. Things were the complete opposite to the present Covid 19 times. From February until June the countryside was out of bounds to walkers due to rampant Foot and Mouth disease. I continued the notes from June to the end of the year when I put the diary away and forgot about it – until, 20 years later Marcia Pirie found a copy in her files and felt that it deserved a wider readership and that now was the time. As the year rolls on we will be interested to see how the detail of Landulph's landscape has fared since 2001.

June 12th Country walking now permitted on roadways but not footpaths...Red bartsia, roses and masses of honeysuckle scenting Tinnel Hill this morning. The character of Haye Marsh is altering since the sluice has been repaired. The tide no longer gets in, so the marsh is drying out.

June 22nd Elderflower, scabious, knapweed, yarrow and meadow

vetchling (yellow). Some butterflies and several oak eggar moth caterpillars – quite large, banded orange and black.

June 24th Various people out in the Tinnel area this Sunday. A pair of semi-tame swans at Salter Mill have brought four cygnets back from their nesting site at Neil Craddock's ponds. Saw musk mallow and oxeye daisy.

June 26th Hot today but overcast by 11a.m. Tide very high but not going in much at Haye Marsh. This may change the vegetation – I'm curious to see what will seed on the bare dry mudbanks. Many different grasses going to seed and sedges on the marshes. Much interest in prairie style gardening



just now. Grasses are selling for £3 - £4 but nature has a lot to offer in the wild. Meadowsweet and wild onion in flower. Cuckoo-pints going yellow. Large parsley-like weed near Tinnel – hope it's not giant hogweed which is poisonous and invasive.

July 7th A period of wet weather has dampened down the pollens. Masses of bramble flowers, St John's wort and naughty ragwort. Also hedge bindweed (large white flower) and field bindweed (pink and white bands, smaller)

July 8th First day of feeling free to walk after Foot and Mouth. A vet (*Sue Hassan*) has just moved into the village and has said that all footpaths are now open.

There are two defibrillators located within our parish, both for public use in an emergency.

- 1. Landulph Memorial Hall in Fore Street
- 2. Cargreen Yacht Club, Coombe Lane.

Landulph Memorial Hall defibrillator:

Located adjacent to front doors

To use you are required to input the code 1111 to unlock, and press the green 'tick' button to open for access.

Cargreen Yacht Club defibrillator

Located on the front wall of the building before you reach the front doors.

This unit is left unlocked, and so no unlock code is required.

Please remember in the event that you may need to use one of the above units, that in a cardiac arrest situation: **continuous CPR is essential while someone else goes to obtain the defibrillator.**
