Parish Council September

The first meeting back in the Memorial Hall still required warm clothing - all the windows and doors were open.

Public Forum; The owners of Colloggett Barns explained their plans to create a 'granny annex' in their barn. The Chair welcomed their engagement with the council, and outlined the planning process from the council's perspective. The definition of an 'annex' was debated, and Councillors suggested the owners use the Pre-Application process.

The writer of these reports apologised to the council for some recent errors which have appeared in the newsletter, which arose through some editorial pruning. The Council suggested it would be appropriate to note that these newsletter reports are independent and are not subject to any oversight by the council.

The Footpaths Officer said she was feeling superfluous. In previous meetings it had been emphasised that members of the public should report issues directly to the relevant County Council bodies. There are currently three reports in the pipeline (stile near Salter Mill, foreshore near Penyoke Mill, Paradise Lane), but when she tried to follow them up she received the answer normally given on call centre lines – 'We are exceptionally busy at the moment...'. This was off-putting, and left her with no influence on events. The Chair put his County Councillor's hat on and said he would escalate this, but encouraged the Footpaths Officer to continue co-ordinating and monitoring issues.

The Climate Action Group's stand at the Village Day had had a moderate response. However the questionnaire circulated around the village had elicited 35 responses – about 12% of the parish – and would now be analysed. A first look at the responses indicated that the relationship of the river on Landulph was important, but people's shopping options were not. Future plans included a stall at the Winter Craft Fair, winter talks on climate topics and bi-monthly newsletter articles. Landulph seems to be ahead of other parishes in addressing climate considerations, and Cornwall has been noted as the best county council in the country for climate action.

The County Council has offered to supply red, white and blue flower seeds (poppies, daisies and cornflowers) as part of the Platinum Jubilee events, so we need to consider where we might plant them. It was agreed to ask the Gardening Club for advice (and assistance!) The vacancy on the Parish Council was still open, and councillors would be prowling for a volunteer.

The suggestion that we challenge 'Nordet' (the Breton Maritime singers performing at the festival) to a game of petanque was still

active. A temporary court might be placed on the recreation ground car park. The Chair had played against a Breton team some years ago and had lost, so there was honour at stake.

Finally Councillor Braund reported the passing of Mavis Edmonds, and asked that her contribution to the Parish Council (13 years as a member, five as Chair) be remembered.

At the End of The Year

Jen Hambly concludes her memoirs of a nature lover with recollections from Autumn and winter 20 years ago when Foot and Mouth

disease locked down Cornwall.

October 17 Masses of birds around. Flocks of wood pigeons. Newly liberated pheasants foraging in the maize field. Spindle berries, an attractive flamingo pink. Found some field mushrooms for a tasty lunch

October 21 Beautiful clear Autumn day .

November 3 Another beautiful day after a cold night. Many birds around.

November 15 Plenty of berries – spindle, sloe, and stinking iris. Birds, too - Yellow wagtails, croaking herons and a lonely egret. **December 2** Most of the leaves now dropped and the raw, grey days are here. Today a mist hung over the river with ghostly yachts showing through geese calling from the Devon shore.

December 17 Several clear frosty days with easterly winds. The Tamar mud appears in silky lavender tones. The mud seems to be getting higher, whereas the main channel is more definitely scoured. The swan family at Salter Mill is still intact, the young ones partly white and all dipping their necks into a bucket of food that Liz Dunn had provided. Going up Tinnel Hill, the hedgerow on the left has been thoroughly pruned and built up under a Countryside Commission Incentive. The banks now seem about 9 foot tall and one of my spaniels took a flying leap off the top, landing in an undignified roll onto the lane.

December 13 The year's Nature Notes Project has now ended. It has made me more observant on my walks. I now possess Christmas binoculars to spot the birds more easily. The last few days of the year, wonderfully defined by frost, have been excellent for walking. The wheat is growing in the fields and catkins have formed up, ready to open before long. And the next year's cycle will roll on.

September 2021 - fast forward 20 years! Although I don't walk as far as I did during the Notes, from what I've seen this year the wild flowers are doing very well.

I've noticed for the first time a big patch of yellow hawksbeard in the Coombe. Something else new at the bottom of the first field after the stile at Coombe Creek is a large swathe of mauve, blue and pink forage crop, mainly vetches and clover. I think this will be good for the insects, birds, animals and soil. Walk up the footpath towards Haye Farm and there is another band of planting this time sunflowers, millet, chicory and sorrel.

There are always interesting things to see in Landulph and not just botany.





Landulph Film Club

A consultation was held recently with regular season ticket holders to seek opinions about restarting the film shows given the present situation with Covid in Cornwall.

The consensus was for caution so for moment the situation will be reviewed in December.

It was noted that in the two years preceding the pandemic audiences for the Film Club screenings had diminished. Possibly the spread of film streaming services was diminishing the attraction of the Film Club. The financial viability of the Film Club depends on attracting an audience. Each show incurs costs of about £120, Hence the need of an audience to meet these costs.








Cutting your Electricity Costs

Saving electricity is good for your purse and good for the environment. We all use lots of electrical appliances but do you know which appliances use the most electricity? The Energy Saving Trust estimate that fridges and freezers use the most electricity mainly because they are on all the time.



When you need to buy a new appliance, choose an energy efficient one and be aware that the energy labelling changed in March 2021 to a simple A to G scale (A is the most efficient). Here are some simple tips to saving electricity:

• Check the door seal on your fridge/freezer, don't overload it, make sure it doesn't need defrosting and that the back is dust free.

- Use a lower temperature on your washing machine and reduce the number of washing and dishwashing cycles - do full loads only
- Air dry clothes rather than using a tumble drier
- Only boil water in the kettle that you need
- Cook using the correct size burner
- Switch off appliances at the plug that don't need to be on standby
- Switch off unnecessary lights and change to LEDs
- Take shorter showers
- Set water heater to lowest comfortable setting
- Turn heating down 1 degree and don't heat rooms you aren't using
- Check water and heating timer times are relevant to your needs
- If you have solar energy do washing and dishwashing when the sun is shining!
- Investigate using a green energy supplier

Local grave records to be digitised

Landulph churchyard, along with every other churchyard in the Truro Diocese, is being digitally mapped along with the parish records, meaning parishes and public will now be able to view the information freely and easily.

The project is free to parishes and all the work will be done by a team from Atlantic Geomatics, the company hired by the Church of England nationally, who will access the churchyard and church so that the mapping and digitizing of the parish records can occur.

Landulph's digital records and images will be integrated with the Church Heritage Record, the national database of the Church of England, to which the diocese has access.

A simplified version of the digital map and images of the records will be freely available for the public to view. Other more complex functionality, such as managing the map and searching across the national database, will be available on payment of a subscription.



Community Tree Planting Event

A small Copse pack of native trees from the Woodland Trust is to be planted on the perimeter of the Searle Memorial Cricket Field. The planting follows the successful merger of Saltash Town Cricket Club and Callington Cricket Club. Ongoing improvements are being made to the entrance, pavilion and pitch at the ground

The Copse pack consists of 30 saplings of silver birch, rowan, and wild cherry with protective spirals and canes. The planting of these trees is important in increasing woodland and tree canopy cover as part of the Forest for Cornwall initiative. It will create a community woodland asset protecting and enhancing biodiversity and ecology.



I am looking for volunteers to help plant these saplings; tree planting can be a safe way to get outdoors and connect with nature whilst playing a part in the green recovery.

The late Michael (Mike) Tyrrell

Mike and his wife Maggie moved to Cargreen in 2014, living on the corner of Coombe Drive and Coombe Lane, and reliant on a wheelchair to get around. He would spend many happy hours in his garage workshop, fettling anything he could lay his hands on, and chatting with passersby. Conversations with Mike were never dull and always a wee bit cheeky too.



His health failed slowly and he died in August in a nursing home. His humanist funeral was a delight, being held outdoors in burial parkland outside Pensilva. 

Life Saving Automatic Defibrillators

There are two defibrillators located within our parish, both for public use in an emergency.

- 1. Landulph Memorial Hall in Fore Street
- 2. Cargreen Yacht Club, Coombe Lane.

Landulph Memorial Hall defibrillator:

Located adjacent to front doors

To use you are required to input the code 1111 to unlock, and press the green 'tick' button to open for access.

Cargreen Yacht Club defibrillator

Located on the front wall of the building before you reach the front doors.

This unit is left unlocked, and so no unlock code is required.

Please remember in the event that you may need to use one of the above units, that in a cardiac arrest situation: **continuous CPR is essential while someone else goes to obtain the defibrillator.**
