Parish Council December

Public Forum The Public asked about the overflowing bridge at Ziggerson Hill and the Chair recommended a member of the public report it. **Traffic** A 'gateway' has been now added to the 30mph sign near Wayton (together with new road markings – Ed). The PC has joined the scheme to use the 30mph flashing speed monitor for two weeks twice a year. Double yellows will be repainted outside the school.

Planning;

- 1. A complex application for upgrades to electrical distribution cables, replacing poles and wire from behind the school across to Tinnel with underground work near Stockadon was debated. Councillor Ansell said 'we need it!' and it was supported unanimously.
- 2. The PC approved that £5,000 be earmarked to support the proposed new layby in the narrows up to Highdown 'if its required'. Highways will undoubtedly 'require' it!

Future of St Barnabas The future of the cottage hospital beside Port View Surgery, Saltash is being considered by an action group which exists to generate a vision for wider healthcare in Saltash. This includes the Leisure Centre facility and development of a 16-bed centre at Treledan. The group wants comments/support by March 2024. Councillors want to focus on GP access and the difficulty of getting from Landulph to Derriford. The target dates are unrealistic but the PC will write offering support.

Henry Searle Field Deer fencing to protect the new trees has been donated by Pentillie. The PC is to write a letter of thanks.

Finance Prior to the precept discussions, there was a detailed review of the Council's finances. More details are on the PC website, but broadly the Council is operating within its budget.

Two grants have been approved from the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL). The CIL is a county-wide fund, and this year's focus is on support for children. Large grants are conditional on having a Neighbourhood Plan:

- £100k has been approved for a new classroom at the school. This is 75% of the expected cost, to be supplemented by other grants (eg County Council (£10k) and Smart Schools (£20k)). The PC will also seek contributions from Ellbridge substation developers of perhaps another £25k. There are precedents for this Indian Queens receive £17k pa for 40 years! At this stage no contributions from the PC are planned. The Under-5s have been involved at all stages of discussions.
- £23,400 to replace major items on the playing field and provide new Rotanet. The total budget is £33k with £10k coming from the PC. However, the grant will be paid retrospectively, so the PC has to find a way of covering the cost until the grant arrives. This might influence the precept.

There were two proposals for the precept:

- 7.1% assuming no grant and scope of playing field work reduced.
- 4.9% assuming the costs for Playing Field upgrades are covered until the grant arrives. This Equates to 44p per month for Band D properties. This was approved.

You Tube

Unexpected item in the bagging tray! Peter Booth's group, cycling from Ho Chi Min City to Singapore, will be sending back videos. The council has access to a YouTube channel hosted by Councillor Tagg, but it would be better for the PC to host its own channel. Equality and diversity problems with YouTube concern the Chair. The PC is to investigate further.

Energy Working Group.

Councillor Ansell reported that county level meetings were starting to identify the challenges. An EV Charging Survey is needed.

Orchard Green Working Group

The orchards are not yet open as there is an insurance issue. ThePC's insurance does not cover third parties on land not owned by the PC. The orchards are Duchy land rented to the farmer on which we are allowed to plant. Currently there is cover for events but not for volunteers, who work at their own risk. Members of the public walking onto the land are not covered. The Clerk is pursuing this.

Parish Council January

Public Forum The Public raised the perennial matter of hedge-cutting on Highdown, asking that the PC be authorised to cut them instead of us invoking road safety and cutting when Highways refuse to do it. The Chair noted the County's clear hedge-cutting guide and that Highways have a million miles of hedge to consider. However, the PC would raise it at the Community Area Partnership meeting.

Matters Arising A banking hub will open in Saltash, involving nine banks (but not Nationwide... is this now an oxymoron?)

Planning Tregwheal at Landulph Cross wanted a discharge of the planning obligation for it to be reserved for local needs. The planning

history of this house seems muddled, but the PC felt the application was confusing 'local needs' and 'affordability'. The need for local housing has been strongly established, so at the very least the owners should try to sell with the obligation in place. The application was rejected; The PC agreed that a consistent approach to similar applications was essential.

Playing Field Working Group The report noted the CIL grant approval, but that formal documentation was still awaited. Three quotes for the work had been received. The company recommended was in North Wales and had 20 years' experience with recycled plastic structures. The grant is only paid retrospectively, so the Finance Working Group (WG) explained how the cash flow would be managed by moving reserves. Completion would leave £9k in the playing field reserve, and the PC approved.

Energy Working Group Draft Terms of Reference were discussed, and the phrase '...establish long term relationship...' (with battery facility developers) was highlighted. This phrase is a euphemism for 'give us some money'. The Chair would be comparing notes with Indian Queens PC, who are ahead of us in this process.

Climate Working Group There is a government strategy to revive temperate rainforest in the UK, 'like wot we've got locally'. The WG will contact National Landscape, and will also support the RSPB garden birdwatch.

Orchard Green Working Group Trees have now been planted after 'intensive' training on how to dig holes! Deer and vole guards are included. Pictures are on the PC website. Issues concerning insurance cover for volunteers are still under discussion. The insurance company says our 'at your own risk' statement for volunteers is inadequate. Changes to the management of volunteers is in hand to overcome this.

The group recommended that the newly dug pathways not be resurfaced until it was seen how they fared. Wood removed from the playground would be used to make a shelter. The group asked for a contribution to costs from our County Councillor's community chest. This would be considered sympathetically!

The launch of Duke Orchard will be delayed until the weather is better. **AOB** One of our more infirm parishioners had struggled with the step down from the phone box/library. Should we install a handrail? The chair agreed to investigate on who's land the box sits.

Landulph - count your plastic!

Landulph residents have been invited once again to join in The Big Plastic Count. It takes place from 11 to 17 March, and registration is now open.

In 2022, a quarter of a million people from households, schools, businesses and communities across the country made The Big Plastic Count is the largest investigation into UK household plastic waste. By counting your plastic waste for one week you helped reveal a shocking truth: that the UK throws away two billion pieces of plastic every week, only 12% of which is recycled.

In 2024, governments will be negotiating a Global Plastics Treaty that could finally phase out plastic production for good. This time we'll be using the results to convince UK ministers to lead the way at these talks and push for a really strong treaty.

Forty-six apple, pear, plum and nut trees went into the ground supported by stakes, tree ties, guards and cable. All the trees are of Tamar Valley stock. A 'copse' of cherry trees will be planted later when stock is available.



Professional gardener Steve
Pearson gave a demonstration of
how to plant fruit trees – it looked so
easy! People fell to the task,
paused for coffee, chocolate
biscuits, mince pies and chat, then
returned to mulch and form the vole
and deer proof guards around the
trees. A huge thank you to the
Duchy of Cornwall and the Best
family who

provided the site, and to everyone who worked on planning and preparation; to those who planted on the day, including five teenagers, to Jo Butcher who stoically planted daffodil bulbs, and to Amanda Pugh our tree warden who brought along some extra saplings for hedging and planting. It was a very happy and productive day.

Footpaths New Volunteer Scheme

The Landulph Footpaths Group has officially joined the Cormac volunteer scheme to work on public footpaths. Cormac is the Cornwall County contractor for the repair of public rights of way. This means the Group is covered by Cormac's public liability insurance (not personal liability) when it carries out small repairs. The first fruits of this can be seen in the new steps leading up to the 'horse corridor' in the field above Penyoke (see page 10) and repairs to the handrail beside steps leading to the field above The Coombe. The materials for this were provided by the Parish Council. The Group must thank Councillor Clare Tagg for setting up this scheme. In the past maintenance has been carried out sporadically by begging funding from various local authorities and desperate ad hoc DIY work by volunteers and local landowners. To volunteer you will need to sign up with the Landulph Public Rights of Way Group coordinator stating that you have read and understood the Induction Pack. The scheme is designed to make your volunteering activity a rewarding experience without pressure. Funding for materials will be from the Parish Council when possible, or by local landowners or local individuals.

The co-ordinator for Landulph is Allen Pack (07854 013103). A meeting

of willing volunteers will be held at Penyoke Farmhouse on 13 February at 11am when a Cormac representative will explain the scheme and answer questions.

The next project is to remove the tree which has blown down on the Penyoke footpath largely blocking it, although the more agile will be able to crawl under. It is understood that Roger Wratten is arranging and funding the work with a qualified contractor. It is likely by the time you read this the trunk will be cleared.



Climate Matters: Reuse, Recycle, Reduce

Our waste collection is changing from April 2024.

Come along to find out all the details and ask all your questions. Our guest speakers include Councillor Carol Mould from Cornwall Council - Portfolio holder for Neighbourhoods including waste collection, disposal and minimisation. Councillor Mould will explain all about the changes including the new fortnightly rubbish collections to help us waste less and recycle more.

With reusing in mind, we are also pleased to welcome Rosie Waters from Saltash Scrapstore. Rosie started the Scrapstore about five years ago with the aim of minimising the amount that goes to landfill. Rosie will explain all about the Scrapstore's success of showing how items that some would consider scrap are of use to others and what the scrapstore has to offer.

Monday 5 March

The future of farming

Food and farming are key industries in Cornwall and play an important role in supporting other sectors including tourism and health. However, farming is changing throughout England and over the next 5-10 years we will see a significant restructuring of many of the farms as we know them today. These changes will not always mean a change in the landscape, although new/replacement buildings will be required and different land use will take place, but it will may involve a change in the size of the holdings and the business structure of the farm business. The main reason for the change is the UK leaving the European Union. When the UK joined the Common Market on 1 January 1973, agricultural policy became the responsibility of the member states through the Commission and the European Parliament. Although the UK Government had a large influence in which policies were adopted, we had to follow the majority decision which was implemented through the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP).

CAP policies have changed over the years but they have resulted in agriculture being a supported sector to ensure the provision of sufficient food to feed the European population at an affordable price and more recently to deliver environmental outcomes. The discussion on the success or otherwise of CAP would take up more space than is

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available here but one result has been that in 2022, 11.8% of our net income was being spent on food to eat at home. This has resulted in the UK having the third most affordable food in the world and compares with 30% of our net income being spent on food for home consumption in the 1950s.

However, the UK produces only 60% of the food that we eat making us one of the countries in Europe with the lowest level of productivity. Farmers in the UK are highly dependent on a financial support mechanism, currently this is the Basic Payment Scheme (BPS). A recent survey of farm businesses found that 47% would not be profitable without BPS. This scheme is now being phased out through the UK Agricultural Transition Plan (ATP) which is the responsibility of DEFRA (Department for Farming and Rural Affairs) which seeks to improve agricultural productivity and target support to deliver public goods by land managers and farmers in terms of programmes such as environmental schemes.

There are many other factors which may lead to change within a farm business and I hope that this short article has given you some of the background to the changes that farmers are experiencing at the moment.

Life Saving Automatic Defibrillators

There are two defibrillators located within our parish, both for public use in an emergency.

- 1. Landulph Memorial Hall in Fore Street
- 2. Cargreen Yacht Club, Coombe Lane.

Landulph Memorial Hall defibrillator:

Located adjacent to front doors

To use you are required to input the code 1111 to unlock, and press the green 'tick' button to open for access.

Cargreen Yacht Club defibrillator

Located on the front wall of the building before you reach the front doors.

This unit is left unlocked, and so no unlock code is required.

Please remember in the event that you may need to use one of the above units, that in a cardiac arrest situation: **continuous CPR is essential while someone else goes to obtain the defibrillator.**
