Parish Council - April

Matters Arising The confusing road name sign for Church Lane had been reported.

Planning Outline application for a bungalow in the garden of Tregwheal (near the Cross). Councillors asked about the impact on the immediate neighbours, but the applicant believed there was no issue. The neighbour should be encouraged to make an on-line comment, but the PC supported the application.

Climate Working Group The group reported a lot of interest in the temperate rainforests at Ziggerson and Weir Point. Members had attended an Energy Day at St Cleer, where Mitchell & Webber were promoting HVO – basically cooking oil – as a green alternative for oil-fired home heating.

Orchard Working Group The official opening of Duke Orchard was



on 27 April and included a 'BioBlitz' and hedgehog survey. The group asked for £500 towards the opening event which would pay for printing, noticeboards, preservative for benches, a metal arch for the entrance and crab apple trees. The group has made a second FIPL grant application for £48,924,42 for the Duchess Orchard: Councillor Worth announced that the grant had been approved two hours before the meeting. Smiles all round! Phone Box Councillor Gawith reported that the land on which the phone box library stands did not appear to be owned by anyone. She will get a quote for a wrought iron handrail for the roadside edge of the platform.

Life Saving Automatic Defibrillators

There are two defibrillators located within our parish, both for public use in an emergency.

- 1. Landulph Memorial Hall in Fore Street
- 2. Cargreen Yacht Club, Coombe Lane.

Landulph Memorial Hall defibrillator:

Located adjacent to front doors

To use you are required to input the code 1111 to unlock, and press the green 'tick' button to open for access.

Cargreen Yacht Club defibrillator

Located on the front wall of the building before you reach the front doors.

This unit is left unlocked, and so no unlock code is required.

Please remember in the event that you may need to use one of the above units, that in a cardiac arrest situation: **continuous CPR is essential while someone else goes to obtain the defibrillator.**

Admin Google's services were becoming very costly, but no progress had been made on replacing them. With the insurance renewal due, there was a review of the Council's fixed assets. Should the new orchard trees be listed? The PC decided that dead trees would not be claimed on insurance so there was no need to list them.

Footpaths The PC is still seeking a suitable contractor and had invited anyone interested in the job to make contact.

Cricket Ground Last month, a parishioner queried public access to the cricket ground near The Cross. This was originally leased to Saltash Cricket Club, with the condition that if they stopped using it then it should be opened for parishioners. Callington Cricket Club had absorbed Saltash CC, so had they inherited the rights of use? More investigation was needed, but public use invariably involved dog walking. The resulting 'presents' made chasing cricket balls fraught with unpleasantness. (Ah, cricket - the sound of willow on leather - remember Cynthia Payne? - and if you understand that, you're as old as I am!)

Abandoned Boats A parishioner reported an abandoned, hazardous fibre-glass dinghy on the foreshore footpath near the Spaniards. Councillor Tagg mused that it could be reported to Cormac, who would do nothing about it. Wider discussion ensued in the public forum about abandoned boats. There are several in our vicinity, including two between Neale Point and the church. No conclusion was forthcoming – ideas would be welcome.

AOB The School PTA requested financial support for centenary celebrations but failed to specify how much! They will be asked to submit a grant application. On the topic of PC grants, over recent years there had been no applications from parish groups. The PC agreed to publicize the availability of grants. (This article - QED!)

The next PC meeting is 20 May, preceded by a Parish Meeting starting 6pm for 30 minutes, when the PC will present its achievements over the year. Councillor Ansell will describe developments at the Elbridge electricity substation, so come along to find out what is going on.

Cargreen Fundraising for Cancer Research


On Saturday June 15 between 10am and 12noon at Landulph Memorial Hall we will

around the edges and a whole lot of different invertebrates hiding out under the logs, we will now set up a database with this information and we aim to keep adding to it. Why?

Orchards provide a vital haven for wildlife when so much of our countryside is under pressure from development. They offer many different habitats and food sources; the combination of fruit trees, grassland, hedgerows and scrub, free from herbicide and pesticide use and soil disturbance, can support thousands of species. In Spring, for instance, the tree blossom will provide a feast of nectar and pollen for local pollinators (most importantly, without them who will pollinate the trees to set the fruit and ensure a good harvest?) The BioBlitz gave us the chance to start recording the biodiversity of the orchard. Doing this is fun and a great way to teach children about our native wildlife and, importantly, will help inform the management of the Orchard so we keep a healthy and balanced ecosystem. We will definitely be back doing more recording, so please let us know if you'd like to help (contact details on page14).

The Secret Life of Duke Orchard

Did you know that our new community orchard has the long term potential to provide both Landulph residents with fruit, cider and fun AND food and shelter for thousands of wildlife species?

The Landulph Climate Group spent a great afternoon running our first 'BioBlitz' at the recent opening of Duke Orchard (see picture on page 2). We had brilliant help from local families as we started the important task of learning what lives in the orchard. Using survey equipment and ID charts loaned by the Tamar Valley National Landscape team, we collected a list of species and mapped where they were found. From birds singing in the hedgerows, to wildflowers

Tamar crossing fees to rise

The owners of the Tamar bridge and Torpoint ferry have submitted plans to raise the cost of the crossing by 40p for cars and light vans. Plymouth City Council and Cornwall Council are asking the Government for permission to raise the fee to £3. Tag discounts will remain at 50 per cent meaning a crossing will cost £1.50. Local MP Sherryl Murray raised the issue in a Parliamentary debate in May asking for Government support to help reduce the increase. The rises have been proposed for some time but the formal application was submitted on 2 May after the Government failed to respond to a letter from Sheryll Murray asking for financial

Objections to the increases have to be lodged by Friday 14 June. They should be sent to: NTCT Casework Manager, National Transport Casework Team Newcastle, Tyneside House, Skinnerburn Road, Newcastle Business Park, Newcastle Upon Tyne, NE4 7AR, or by email to nationalcasework@dft.gov.uk. Full details of the proposal are available at the Tamar Bridge Office and the Torpoint Ferry Office.

The Transport Secretary, Mike Harper, will make his decision on the application in due course. He also has the power to call for a public inquiry. Members of the Bridge and Ferry joint committee will continue to lobby the Department for Government support for the crossings.

Slow worms

It is a thrill and a privilege to see one of these fascinating and beautiful creatures in the garden. You may know some of the facts about this most interesting reptile, but some may surprise you. They are a friend of the gardener as they eat small invertebrates like slugs and snails.

Firstly, many people know that a slow worm is not a snake, although it looks somewhat like one. It is actually a legless lizard. If you handle one, you will find they are smooth and silky; but be gentle as it has the ability, like a lizard, to shed its tail to escape if they feel threatened. They do not bite or sting.

They love humid and thick vegetation, so allowing a part of your

Sunken yacht recovered – at last

Ocean Wave, a 39ft Jeanneau Sun Fast owned by Malcolm McGee, was moored off the Crooked Spaniard Inn when it was struck by

lightning and sank in March.

After several weeks sitting on the bottom of the Tamar, the yacht was declared an insurance writeoff and removed on a low loader for recycling by Marine and Boat Recycling in Tavistock.

Using air bags for buoyancy, it took the crew of the salvage boat





several attempts to get her to the surface. A diver spent many hours underwater over several days working in zero visibility to attach the flotation devices securely.

The wreck was towed to the Spaniard Quay where South West Crane Hire lifted her ashore. Then the job of pumping and digging out 10 tons of silt began before she

was light enough for the journey. The operation involved some of the largest machinery ever seen in the village. Even so, the weight of the yacht meant it had to be lifted out of the car park in stages – 'bunny hopping'.

The hull was lifted on to a low loader which proved too short. Fortunately it had an extendable section which was tromboned' out by an extra 2m.

space to be a bit wild will help them. They also like to be able to sun themselves on a warm path and to find a warm refuge under a piece of corrugated iron sheet or in the warmth of a compost heap. Last autumn I had the misfortune to disturb one in hibernation and learnt that they usually bury themselves underground from about October to April or May. This is



probably why they were named as a worm. They have up to twelve offspring born live, having hatched from eggs inside their mother (ovoviparous). They are also our longest living reptile with an average lifespan of 20 to 30 years; one has been documented at over 50. They are protected by the Wildlife and Countryside Act, but sadly we cannot explain this to the cats who are one of their main predators!

We made it back to Landulph School!




James, Andy, Ben, Frank, Arron, Chris, Dan, Steve, Christian and Brian, parents of Landulph School children past, present and future, walked the Tamara Coast to Coast Way across three days kicking off at Morwenstow and ending at Landulph School.

Day one was an exciting 24 miles up and down the coast path, through bluebell woods, passing the source of the Tamar and ending with a night camping in Bakesdown Farm. Day two was a gruelling 29 miles along country roads, with a pitstop at Firebrand

hundreds of bulbs. There will be more fruit trees and a willow tunnel in a natural play area and for basket weaving. Biodiversity will be enhanced by planting local species to extend the hedgerows and, as an experiment, a new tiny forest using the Miyawaki system, a natural approach to speed up tree growth.

Duchess Green will be accessible via a board-walk bridge over the pond. We aim to make the paths at the lower part of the field wheelchair/buggy friendly with access to a composting toilet.



In addition to some seating and picnic areas, our grant covers a tiered green meeting space and two field shelters with natural roofs which will have bird watching slots. A path right round the field will be a welcome addition for those who like to run.

The development of Duchess Green is being guided by an ecology study and we aim to install bat and nesting boxes. If you'd like to know more about the development please see our section on the www.landulph.org.uk, attend a Parish Council meeting (there is a report at every meeting), talk to a member of the Working Group or become a volunteer (see page 12). Please don't try to visit Duchess Green at present as there is no public access.
