Parish Council

The Council meeting on 19 May probably broke a number of records for turnout and length. The meeting lasted three hours but, we were rewarded with wine and cakes at the end of the meeting.

Turnout was disappointing, but the numbers were enhanced by the presence of Cornwall Councillor Daniel Pugh, our local MP's parliamentary assistant Chris Wilton, three members of Community Enterpises PL12 and Tony Parry of the Saltash Hopper who brought his bus to the meeting (parked outside) for villagers to inspect. Sadly, Newsletter rep, Allen Pack was the only member of the public present.

Tony Parry gave a presentation on the potential uses for the Hopper service, of which many of those present were unaware. It is available for all ages, clubs, groups and societies, and can even be booked for nights out. We hope to publish further details of this service in the next Newsletter. Details of the Community Enterprise PL12 presentation are reported elsewhere in this issue.

Visibility problems in Parish lanes, due to overgrown hedges, were discussed. The need to delay the spring cut until flowers and the cycle of hedgerow life had moved on, had to be balanced against the risk of traffic accidents, the council heard. It was agreed to write to all those responsible for maintaining roadside hedges to remind them of their responsibilities. There was disappointing news about double white lines on the A388 between Homeleigh Cottages and the Sillaton turn off. The Highways Authority is now denying they agreed to create these lines. They also now appear to be back-tracking on their commitment to erect a safety barrier at the bottom of Ziggaarson Hill. The Council will continue to press for these matters to be completed.

The meeting heard that the new website, www.landulph.org.uk is now up and running and Katherine Williams, Clerk to the Council, is the website administrator. The website has pages concerning local history, official Council minutes and, of course, copies of the Landulph News. All Parish organisations, clubs and associations are encouraged to give Katherine Williams their contact details and, if appropriate, links to their own websites, for inclusion on the site.

The police have reported that oil has been stolen from a tank in Landrake and advise that exposed tanks in Landulph should be made secure. There was also discussions on the latest moves by the owners of The Crooked Spaniards Inn and the development of the Solar Park, which are reported on more fully elsewhere.

Councillor Reg Price reported that the introduction of the Mobile Shop had been delayed due to a major failure in its generator for the refrigeration plant on its first outing. It has now been repaired and will be visiting LMH & Coombe Lane Tuesday mornings (see diary in this edition for details)

New plans for the Crooked Spaniards

The owners of the Crooked Spaniards Inn, Tony and Sandra Arnold, are about to unveil new plans for development of the site following the failure of their appeal against the refusal of their last proposals last year. In March this year a Pre-Planning Application was lodged on the Cornwall Planning Website but no details were available. These will be at least the fourth set of plans to be put forward since they bought the Inn.

Mr and Mrs Arnold have appointed new consultants and architects to work on the revised proposals. At its recent meeting the Parish Council was told by Chairman, Councillor Gerry Stevenson, that he had been asked to attend a private briefing with the Arnolds and their team but councillors insisted that any meeting should be with all the democratically elected Parish representatives. The purpose of such a meeting would be to hear the current thinking of the developers on how to address the reasons for refusal detailed in the Planning Inspectors report on last year's application. This would be followed by full public consultation with parishioners. Watch this space and the Cornwall Council



Electric Fields



Anyone driving into the parish down Ziggarson Hill, or driving out of the parish past Wayton, cannot have failed to have noticed the large Solar Park that has sprung up at North Wayton. But, what's it all about? Well, the site covers an area of some 41.5 acres and its generating capacity, when it becomes operational, is stated to be some 7MW (mega watts) with an estimated annual output of 7.35MWh mega watt hours), equivalent to the needs of 1,488 houses in Cornwall. With a population of around 500 souls I would estimate the total number of dwellings in the parish to be in the region of 300, so that's nearly 5 times the total electrical requirement for the parish.

Planning consent for the development was granted on 8 April 2013. That consent is 'temporary' and lasts for a period of 25 years after which the panels must be decommissioned and dismantled. The operator of the installation is a company called KS SPV21 Limited, a wholly owned subsidiary of a German company Kronos Solar Projects GmbH. Very little in the way of objections were raised at the planning stage although I suspect some failed to appreciate just how large the development was going to be, and the visual impact it would have on the surrounding area. One might be tempted to question why we have such a large development which is forecast to generate 5 times our need. One answer is that there is something else in this for us, the parish. As part of the planning conditions, a unilateral undertaking was given by the applicants whereby the applicants would either furnish any buildings owned by the parish with solar panels or provide a lump sum payment of £30,000. Not surprisingly. given the lack of suitable buildings owned by the parish, the Parish Council elected for the latter.

These monies are to be held by Cornwall Council for the benefit of the parish of Landulph. There is some debate over whether there are any restrictions as to usage. The unilateral undertaking itself is unclear. The key issue is that the funding must be used for the benefit of the parish as a whole, and this has to be agreed with Cornwall Council before they will release the funds. I understand that the Parish Council would welcome opinions from all sections of the community as to the sort of project which might benefit the community as a whole. Suggestions for good ways to spend the money should be sent to the Parish Clerk, Katherine Williams. For me, the one unanswered question is, given the Law of Physics which states that the total energy of an isolated system cannot change, does the proliferation of these solar parks make the world an imperceptibly darker place?

Landulph Would Welcome A Woman Priest

At its last meeting members of the Landulph Parochial Church Council officially voted to welcome the ministry of a woman priest both presiding at a service of Holy Communion and fulfilling the role of incumbent or priest in charge. The PCC unanimously rescinded what are helpfully called Resolutions A and B which called for only male candidates. Although there is no immediate prospect of an appointment, our new Rector will be resident in Calstock and responsible for our benefice of Landulph Pillaton St Dominik and St Mellion and that of Calstock. Harrowbarrow and Gunnislake - quite an undertaking. But it is hoped that a 'house for duty' will be provided when the current St Mellion Rectory is developed. A house for duty is just that: the Church of England will provide a house for a priest in return for his or her ministry in support of the incumbent. In Landulph we have prepared our Statement of Needs, painting a picture of life in Landulph parish and the particular gifts we would seek in a new incumbent. Meanwhile, despite the current lack of a parish priest, two services take place in the combined Benefice each Sunday as listed on the village notice boards. The PCC is very grateful to our Readers and local retired clergy for continuing to minister to us, and to friends of the church who help us in practical ways - grass and hedge cutting, drain unblocking etc, as well as church cleaning and flower arranging. Two trees have been planted recently in the grassy area beside the church car park, in memory of Les Clark and John Barrett, and we are grateful to Roger Desborough for taking the ceremonies that accompanied the plantings. 
