## **Free Local Bus Travel**

Local bus travel is now free for residents of Cornwall over the age of 60 and for people with certain disabilities.

If you currently have a Cornish Key card or Buses in Cornwall card, you do not need to apply for a new one. Both cards entitle the holders to concessionary fares (and library usage if requested) and will continue to do so for the foreseeable future. The entitlement to half fare has been automatically changed to free fare, from April 1<sup>st</sup> 2006.

**Did you know** that the free bus pass can also be used to travel to Derriford? Park your car in the Saltash Leisure Centre free car park, catch the bus and thus avoid the bridge toll and Derriford Hospital's parking fee as well!

## **Cargreen Yacht Club** **The Jester Challenge:**

Tony Head's progress on Triple Venture, by Nick Head

The Jester Challenge is a new single-handed transatlantic event for yachts of 20-30 ft from Plymouth to Newport, Rhode Island, a distance of 2800 miles. If this year's Jester Challenge is a success, then a second event will be held in 2010 to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Blondie Hasler's original Observer Single-handed Transatlantic Race in 1960. The Cargreen Yacht Club has two entries this year, Tony Head on Triple Venture and Sherman Wright on Andromeda. Tony is the son of Mattie Head – late of Coombe Lane.

Triple Venture is a Twister class yacht, home completed from GRP mouldings supplied by Tylers. In the weeks leading up to the start, much time was spent in equipping and modifying the yacht for the event. This included installation of new batteries, vane self-steering, radar and ship to shore communications.

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> June at 1200, 10 Yachts started the Jester Challenge, ranging in size from 21 – 30 ft. Shortly after the start Tony returned to Plymouth to complete some unfinished business and also to find a bee infestation at home which delayed him even further. He restarted the event on Monday June 5<sup>th</sup> and by early morning on the 6<sup>th</sup> June was off the Lizard, heading towards Southern Ireland. The 9<sup>th</sup> June saw him clear of Southern Ireland and heading into the Atlantic. On 10<sup>th</sup> June, the weather deteriorated with gales. It was at this point that both batteries failed, which necessitated Tony retiring to Dingle in S. Ireland to purchase new batteries and to effect other minor repairs.

Triple Venture rejoined the event on 17<sup>th</sup> June and by 19<sup>th</sup> of June was at 15° W. Here the next gale struck and Tony hove to under storm jib and trysail for 24 hours. As I write he is heading in a southwesterly direction, aiming for 45°N and hoping for better weather. To be continued.....

## **Rainfall Records from Ken Eastment**

Rainfall measurements were first taken at Bounds Tenement, Cargreen in 1958 and have continued almost uninterrupted since that time. The site is 50 ft above sea level and I use a standard met rain gauge with a 5" deep funnel, one foot above the ground.

Readings are taken at 0900 GMT daily and recorded to the previous day. The average yearly rainfall total for this site is 46 ins.

In the past, records were sent to the Cornwall Rainfall Association and to the then Cornwall River Authority. Rain and hail reports were sent with the observations of thunderstorms before more modern equipment came into use. The frequency of overhead thunderstorms, which produce high rainfall, has decreased from twelve a year during the 1950s and 60s to about three a year now.

On 28<sup>th</sup> July 1969 a record rainfall of 4.60 ins was recorded over 24 hours. This was due to a small depression north of the Azores, which deepened and moved up the English Channel. Nearby Ellbridge Gardens, then a registered Climate Station, measured 5.71 ins and Plymouth 4.46 ins, the wettest day since records began in 1921.

This year, the first six months have produced 383mm of rain, compared to 437mm in 2005. The June total was 42.9mm with 7 days of rain, the highest on the 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> with 34.8mm.

All my observations are strictly as an amateur.

## **Landulph School**

Landulph School continues to form an integral part of the community, although children come from Hatt and Saltash, as well as Landulph Parish. The staff are committed to providing the very best education for the children supported by the Head teacher and Governors. There is good parental involvement and the PTA have organised fund-raising and social events throughout the year.

Pupil numbers have remained fairly constant but staff changes have taken place during the year. The Autumn Term will begin with a new class structure, again to provide the best learning environment for the children.

The children have taken part in visits, to enrich their education and visitors have also come to the school to enhance aspects of the curriculum. Sport also has a high profile and sporting events have taken place in which the children have taken part.

The planned extension work to the side of the school is now in progress and will provide additional storage and a toilet for the disabled. A very busy and successful year for Landulph School. Do look at the School Notice Board for details of forthcoming events.

## **Cornwall Wildlife Trust Nature Reserves**

The Tamar estuary forms one of the largest areas of mudflats in the south west and characteristic wildlife of this reserve include Shelduck which are resident here, nesting during the early summer in burrows which offer a safe haven for these brightly-coloured birds whilst incubating their eggs. This species is most at home on soft mudflats, feeding by sweeping sideways with their red bills.

Kingfishers may sometimes be seen as a blue streak darting across the surface of the water in the sheltered inlets of the estuary. They feed on small fish which are caught when the birds dive on to them from above, either from a perch or from the air,

The estuary supports a large wintering population of avocet, easily recognisable by their pied plumage and bluish legs. They wade through the shallow water and, with their delicately upturned bills, skim tiny animals from the surface layers of the water and mud. The first birds arrive in October and leave again during March.

## **Landulph Church Fete**

Landulph Church held their annual fete on Saturday July 22<sup>nd</sup> at the home of Nicky and Steve Toynton and family. There were a few rain drops in the morning but the afternoon was dry and sunny.

There was a good attendance both by local Landulph and Cargreen inhabitants and many people also came from neighbouring parishes. Stalls included a well stocked plant stall, books, cakes and bric-a-brac, as well as many games and raffles. Children were well looked after, with the opportunity for a ride on a mini-train and also a bouncy castle on which to use up their energy.

An unusual attraction was the chance to have a shiatsu massage in the open air, which proved very popular.

There were plenty of places to sit and enjoy cream teas and ice creams under the trees in the garden, which provided shade.

In the Landulph Parish Plan, housing for local people that was affordable was identified as a priority.

It is anticipated that the sites identified by Caradon District Council [in consultation with the land owners], as suitable for affordable housing will be on display.

It is also hoped that a model of the type of housing that the Housing Association would build will also be on display.

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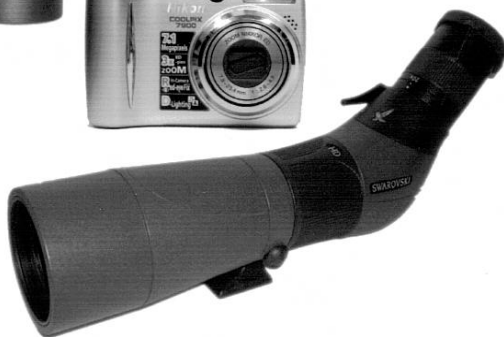
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
