On the face of it, this is a healthy sum, but in order to cover ink toner usage for the October edition we had to spend £333, and the same again for this edition. These are abnormally high consumptions, because we have done additional printing for the Yacht Club, the Festival, and Cancer Research, and we have charged these organisations a competitive rate.

Nonetheless our basic running costs always exceed anticipated income from advertisers (adverts fees to be increased from Feb 2010), and we can no longer rely on grants to keep us going. Our appeal for donations in the October edition raised £217 for which we are very grateful, but we make no apology for asking for more. **If we run out of money, we stop printing.**

So, to keep the newsletter going, we invite all recipients to donate £5, more would be even better, and enclose an envelope to make this easy. If every address responds, we may not have to ask again for another year. Please add us to your Christmas present list, and make the donation now while you remember. Parish Council Meeting 19 October 2009

In public forum, David Bullivent asked council to have a policy on provision of allotments. Chairman Andrew Butcher said that this would be included in the next Parish Plan. Andrew reminded the meeting of the recent death of ex-councillor Harold Bolt, and asked for a minute's silence in tribute. He then welcomed new councillor George Lipscomb.

The formal agenda was a bit thin,

and there's little of social significance to report, so small things caught the eye. We were diverted by the entry of Police Community Support Officer Yates, who wrestled briefly with an unlocked door before appearing in full patrol kit to tell us that there was very little **crime** in the parish, but to be aware that there was a rise regionally in thefts of vehicle fuel and heating oil from ordinary homes.

Resurrection of the **Parish Plan**,

first mooted 18 months ago, will now be progressed in consultation with the authors of the existing Plan. Already, suggestions for change are emerging, for example a focus on renewable energy generally, and for council to agree with parishioners a set of guidelines on planning matters, so as to achieve consistency in decision-making. Councillor Stevenson told the meeting that the issuing of **speed guns** to schoolchildren had been discussed at the Area Road Safety Committee in Saltash, and that the scheme might be introduced in Landulph. Am I allowed to

say how batty this idea seems? Apparently not...

The meeting petered out as the Chairman's respiratory infection strangled his voice and he ran out of Kleenex.

Parish Council Meeting 16 November 2009

Did you notice that of the five ordinary members of the public in attendance, three of them were ex-councillors? What keeps drawing them back, I wondered. But as the meeting progressed, their roles became clearer.

The agenda was too dull to bother you with, but at various points when the councillors were in a wisdom deficit, the meeting was suspended so that the greybeards (sorry, Mavis) could plug the information gaps and give guidance on what to do next.

In Westminster, the Lords do this for the Commons, and are suitably honoured, and are occasionally allowed to wear silly clothes without mockery. Sadly, we can't afford to dress Lord Trelawney, Lord Philip of Coombe or Lady Edmonds in ermine; in fact council was struggling to find things to spend money on in the next FY. Despite their best efforts, the

projected total was about £2500 lower than this year's. The clerk recommended that a similar bid to this year's would leave room for contingencies, so council initially suggested bidding for extra money to buy land for allotments, before deciding to bid for funding of the Parish Plan.

So that's next year's precept sorted.

Exceptionally, the next meeting is on the second Monday of the month i.e. 14th December, so that Xmas preparations don't distract us from attending. Why not make your first visit?

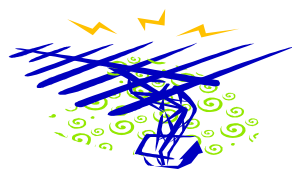

First Responders

Five years ago, seven of us from the Parish completed our First Responder training with the West Country Ambulance Services Trust.

One of the seven never made the start date for personal reasons and not too long afterwards the sixth person moved away. We have been operating for some while with a personnel of four.

We, at the request of the Ambulance Service, attend certain medical emergencies in the parish.

The remaining four Responders have, like the three we have lost, not been immune from life changing events that make our continued participation in this scheme in doubt. (For myself its an age thing!)

I personally will be retiring from the Responder scheme in 12 months time. This I hope will give others time to volunteer and be trained.

Ideally, to give the most cover, another three or four people are needed. No medical knowledge is needed initially and the training is good.

Older residents of Landulph- Neil Cradick

Neil was born at Lower Stockadon just before the outbreak of war, but assures me that the two events are not connected. Parents Len and Jenny moved to the farm from St Dominick in 1933 and the family lived there through the Second World War. Originally, Neil attended school in Callington, and recalls clearly his last day there at age 6, when he came out to find the streets full of soldiers, and no bus to take him home. Neil continued his education at Landulph School, or Cross College as it became affectionately known.

He left at age 15, the family having by now moved to St Anns which Father Len had purchased in 1945. Work was a mixture, the family kept pigs, young stock, and milked a dairy herd of just 25. Market gardening also played its part, in particular strawberries for which Neil was later to become well known as a local expert.

On building the new milking parlour in 1965 Neil took over the running of the family business.

Neil also became a keen photographer at this time and for many years turned his hobby into a successful business, freelancing for local newspapers and covering many weddings and local events.

Two additional fields were bought to extend the farm, and the milking herd count increased to around 70. There were also 200 pigs and 2000 hens, but the farm later became principally a dairy herd and for many years St Ann's supplied the village milk through a local milk round.

The milk round was sold, and in 1991, Neil and wife Rose turned their attention to soft fruit, particularly strawberries, later followed by the addition of a large cherry orchard and raspberries. This was the birth of Tamara Soft Fruits.



On the more personal side, Neil spent many years both as Chairman and as a member of the Parish council. He is president of the Landulph Gardening Club and over the years has been involved in many local societies and organizations. Those who know him will be aware that he is passionate about the future of the parish, and he has spent a great deal of time supporting and helping to retain its character.

Neil claims to have retired, but I don't think you'll find a busier retired farmer.
