Parish Council Meeting 19 th February 2007

Opening the meeting, the Chair introduced Sue Hooper, who will replace Joan Worth as Clerk, and PCs Burgess and Hodges. PC Hodges includes Landulph in her Community Support Officer role. PC Burgess said that in year 2006, there had been 19 reported crime cases in the parish compared to about 10 or 11 in previous years. Thefts from boats and cars accounted for the increase.

Selective items of general interest:

Public Forum: Traffic control around the school at beginning and end of the school day was discussed at great length. Parent-governors said that poor parking by parents, and speeding by other motorists were compromising child safety. PC Burgess advised that the school should control parking in its lay-by, and that careless driving should be reported to the Police with registration number. Councillor McTaggart said that if a formal request were made to him,

he might be able to expedite provision of a flashing true-speed beacon at the approach to Landulph Cross.

Council Session: A doctor had been appointed to St Barnabas Hospital.

Affordable Housing, Council noted that after distribution of over 200 questionnaires, 32 replies had been received, with only 3 households (7 people) seeking affordable housing in the parish. Councillors agreed to advise Caradon to leave the scheme in abeyance for the time being, as there was insufficient demand within the parish to justify building of even the minimum number of economically viable dwellings.

Re **Cloake Place** retirement bungalows, it was agreed that an article in the parish Newsletter would be welcome in explaining how applications and allocations are made, so that locals are not disadvantaged.

Planning: Recommended by Parish Council for approval:

Enlargement of dormer, insertion of patio doors & balustrading, 3 Hodders Way. Dr & Mrs Bowman.

Removal of agricultural occupancy restriction, Wadavers, Church Lane. Mr & Mrs du Plessis.

Retention of conservatory, 13 Coombe Drive. Dr Douglas.

Meeting lasted 80 minutes. Public attendance 8, with councillors Mr & Mrs McTaggart in attendance.

Parish Council Meeting & Annual Assembly 19th March 2007

These are not minutes of the meeting; only those points that may be of general interest are noted here.

Planning: Recommended for refusal-

Construction of detached dwelling & demolition of garage/store. Wind Drift, Fore Street, Cargreen, Mrs H Bell.

Recommended for approval-

Construction of rear conservatory (revised plan), 4 Stockadon Barns, Stevenson Homes.

Construction of extension, Landulph Memorial Hall/ Landulph Parish Council.

Construction of wall, extended flat roof with terrace over, enlarged boiler room and DIY workshop, 7 Hodders Way, Cargreen, Mr & Mrs Hemmens.

An open meeting will be held at Penyoke playing field at 3 pm on Monday 23rd April, when Spartina growth in the creek will be discussed.

A site assessment at Landulph Cross will be held, re type and location of speed-monitoring equipment. A county-wide appraisal of speed limits is to be undertaken.

The brief general meeting ended with Sue Hooper being formally welcomed as the new Clerk to the Parish Council in succession to Joan Worth. John Wright then made an appreciative speech of thanks and a presentation to Joan.

The **Annual Assembly** Chairman's synopsis and presentation of Accounts were swiftly welcomed. The guest speaker, Mr David Owens, Waste Manager with Cornwall County Council, explained the need for active waste management, noted that the District currently recycled 26% of waste with ambitions to do better, and highlighted some unexpected facts, e.g. Cornwall had one of the highest waste outputs in the UK per person (580 Kg per year); all except compostable waste was recycled elsewhere in the UK; milk bottles were the main source of the only type of plastic routinely recycled in bulk in the UK; Cornwall disposed annually of 1100 tonnes of aerosol cans, 9600 of shoes, 12200 of disposable nappies. Mr Owens said that the county had adopted all the easily achievable recycling options, and that next steps would set more ambitious targets and inevitably place more demands and costs on residents. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETINGS - STARK WARNINGS

The AGMs of the Management Committee and the Fund Raising Committee took place, respectively, on 26th February and 6th March. The reports and discussions at both the meetings focused on the same worrying issue; it was disclosed that the net income that keeps the hall going as an independent entity was much the lowest for several years. The officers of both committees gave out stark warnings about the situation.

In his reports Chairman of both committees, Philip Braund said that the annual revenue from lettings should cover the annual running expenses of the hall but in the past year it had not and had been subsidised from fund raising revenue. Without the annual fund raising monies, rental rates would have to increase by 50%. Regrettably, this might be the case in future because support for fund raising events had declined steadily over the three years. In the past year a lot of money had been spent on essential repairs and improvements but most of these had been paid for grant money, raised by Treasurer Mavis Edmonds.

It was a fact that a well managed and healthy financial situation helped to

secure grants and this had been the case in the past year, but perhaps was no longer so.

Philip Braund closed by thanking all those who had helped and contributed to the Hall's upkeep over the past year and said that without more help and support from the community, the Memorial Hall faced an uncertain future. The willing group of volunteers who run it would lose heart and he wondered what would happen to all the clubs and organisations that use it if it were no longer available.

We know that they intend to remove fallen and overhanging trees on footpath No.1, which is the foreshore path. This is classified as a **Gold** path and priority is given to the maintenance of such paths. Sadly this means that there is seldom money left to be allocated to **Silver** paths. This means that in our parish, the long standing problems on footpaths 10 and 12, which run from Salter Mill up through Hays Farm and then back to the Coombe, will probably not receive funding from the County Council. We continue to try and remedy these problems.

The keen eyed readers will also realise that I failed to get a report on the post-Christmas Parish walks into the last newsletter. More than 40 people turned out and had a thoroughly enjoyable morning, followed by a good social get together over soup and sandwiches at the Crooked Spaniards. Food Hygiene Course

We were wondering if there were any groups of people or individuals who would be interested in completing a Foundation Certificate in Food Hygiene.

With all the new legislation coming in regarding food handling, it is a good idea for organisations that provide or handle food to demonstrate that they are taking appropriate measures to ensure the safety of consumers. This certificate will enable you to prove 'due diligence' with regard to food hygiene. So if you belong to a club that provides food, even if it is only a pasty or two, this might be the course for you!

Unfortunately there is a cost involved (approx £31.00 per person) and we would need to have a minimum of 16 people to be able to hold it locally (Landulph Memorial Hall annexe). This means that not only is it convenient, but this particular course is one day, whereas the course held at Saltash College is a 2 day event (Basic Food Handling Certificate £35.00).

Gables Farm Celebrates a Centenary of Care

To mark 100 years in the city, Gables Farm will be holding a series of events throughout 2007 to celebrate its Centenary, honour its heritage, raise funds and increase awareness of its cause to an even wider audience.

"We hope the people of Plymouth will take our Centenary campaign to their hearts and work extremely hard to raise money for us by getting involved in our calendar of events as well as hopefully, developing their own fundraising ideas," said Tony Harris, the general manager of Gables Farm. *"During the year we hope to attract a fresh wave of support that will carry us forward for decades to come and help us finance the care we provide to many hundreds of animals each year".*

Staff at Gables Farm have been serving the region's four legged

friends since it was founded in 1907 by two sisters, who cycled around Plymouth collecting stray cats and then later dogs too.

Originally based at Cattedown, Gables Farm moved to its purpose-built site near Saltram House, with state of the art accommodation in 1999. This move coincided with an intensive programme of re-branding and restructuring that helped the city's major animal welfare charity to become a more competitive

force. In order to address the need of expanding waiting lists and overcome limited space, the modernisation of Gables Farm's facilities is an ongoing requirement. Extensive refurbishment is already currently underway on existing dog kennels, coupled with an appeal to raise funds for additional accommodation.

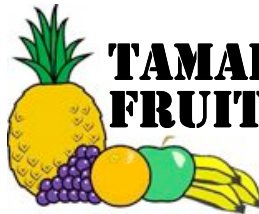
Landulph Gardening Club

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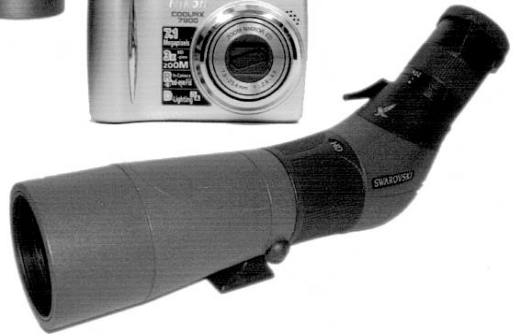
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New Residents in the Parish

What is the point of a website?

What use is a village website ?

There are three primary uses for a website for the village – a calendar, a directory, and an archive.

The website **calendar** provides a common place to find out what is going on. Anyone living in the parish can add and update their own entries to the calendar – simply 'register' on the www.landulph.com website with a Landulph address and you will be able to add your own events.

Local users can also add their own entries to the **directory**. So whether you are running a business, or a club, or simply have an interest in genealogy, you can add entries and links that everyone can see. This makes a resource both for existing residents, visitors, and potential incomers.

Finally a village website can act as a community **archive** – not only back issues of this Newsletter, but all sorts of material can be stored here and shared. I hope that by the time you are reading this I will have uploaded the 1999 Millennium Photographic Exhibition. Anything else, from Parish Council minutes to your gardening notes, can be placed here, gradually building up an archive of life in Cargreen & Landulph.

The facility is there for you to use; register at www.landulph.com and put your birthday on the calendar – you might get a surprise present!

Cornwall Gateway CIC

In the beginning was the **Parish Plan**. This provides a vision of what we would like to see happen in the parish over the next few years.

Then there was the **Market & Coastal Towns Initiative (MCTI)**. This looked at a slightly wider area – the PL12 area covering all the villages whose nearest shops and facilities are in Saltash. MCTI produced a 'Community Strategic Action Plan (the CSAP) for the whole PL12 area.

Then the MCTI, having produced its grand vision, developed into a 'Community Interest Company' (a CIC is a non-profit making commercial body) which is charged making the projects in the CSAP happen.

The role of the Saltash Gateway CIC is to set up projects and find funds for implementing the CSAP priorities. This is a real opportunity for the six parishes to work together through the CIC to achieve more than they can in isolation, we are stronger sharing resources and working together.

Two of the twelve CIC directors, myself and Sue Renfree, live outside Saltash within the PL12 area and we have picked up the projects specifically focused on the outlying communities. The two major themes are village services and sustainable community transport.

There is some exciting potential here for getting real improvements for people in the parish.
