## Parish Council Meeting 21 April 2008

During **public forum**, Council was asked why there had been no progress in extending the 30 mph limit into the village, and why some sections of the road surface between Landulph Cross and Stockadon had not been upgraded.

The policewoman attending the meeting said that parents at Landulph School would be given parking information of relevance to recent problems. By coincidence (or was it...) leaflets were available to councillors and lucky members of the public, notifying that on 5<sup>th</sup> May 2008, responsibility for enforcement of on-street parking would devolve from the police to local authorities, with uniformed Civil Enforcement Officers (just when we'd got used to Traffic Wardens) ensuring compliance. The police would retain responsibility for endorsable parking offences such as dangerous or obstructive parking, or where there were emergency or security factors.

Parish Council had received a letter from Mr Coryton of Pentille, pointing out that the estate had title to the piece of land at the Coombe (site of Roma's seat), about which Parish had raised a query.

As part of the run-up to **abolition of the District Councils**, Parish had advised County that it favoured the creation of a local ward to be covered by one county councillor, representing the parishes of Landulph, Botus Fleming, St Mellion, Pillaton, St Dominick and Landrake. Alternatively as a second choice, a two-councillor ward for the Tamar Valley, comprising the above six parishes minus Landrake but plus Calstock.

Parish had been invited to support the **Cornish Real Nappy Project**, which seeks to reduce greenhouse gases and landfill by persuading parents away from disposables. Apparently the UK throws away around 3 billion disposable nappies each year, accounting for about 690,000 tonnes of waste. A switch to home-laundered nappies could save a family up to £500. Wow. More kids= more holiday money, or have I missed something?

10 members of the public, police constable, and District Councillor Garner attended.

## Parish Council Meeting 19 May 2008

This being the council's **Annual General Meeting**, it was a pity that hundreds missed the formal procession of gorgeously attired councillors to the council chamber. Roger was re-elected as chairman, and other posts filled appropriately. Annual accounts were approved. Councillors agreed to lodge statements of all **expenses** so that costs of their services could be made clear the first time, but it was left to their discretion whether to claim payment; don't panic, none seemed disposed to claim, and in any case

there's no money in the precept for expenses. Council was pleased to read out a letter from Mr Coryton of Pentille, saying that **public access to benches** on the estate's land on Hays Farm shore and at the Coombe could continue informally as before.

I'm ignoring other matters to bring to your attention a long discussion by councillors on whether **draft minutes** of their meetings should be made available to the public on noticeboards and the parish website. Those in favour wanted us to have advance notice of the council's current concerns so that the council could get feedback from us in advance of their next meeting, while those against thought the matter either pointless or inappropriate until formally approved. They deferred decision for a month for some heavy cogitation. So if you have a view and wish to influence the outcome, tell a councillor a.s.a.p. It's only a year ago that council minutes were written in a ledger by the then clerk and read out in full before approval, and then left the parish. We're making progress now, but fitfully. Councillors were not too keen either to continue with the **10-minute public forum** that concludes the meetings, recently introduced on a trial basis to allow reaction to proceedings etc. I got the feeling that there was some resentment at perceived criticism and occasional pressure for them to reverse decisions. With about as much enthusiasm as a child taking his syrup of figs, they agreed to continue the forum for a further year, with the clear proviso that they would not engage in debate, simply note feedback. We'll see.

13 members of the public and District Councillor Garner attended.

## Landulph Footpaths

Those of you who have been walking around the parish footpaths during the recent lovely weather will have been amazed and delighted at the great improvements. We are very lucky that not only have all outstanding problems been addressed but there have also been many improvements made.

Both footpath 4, that runs up the hill from the playing field at **Penyoke** and through to the road and **Paradise Lane Bridleway**, are designated as a “gold paths” and therefore attract priority funding. The very awkward stile at the start of the Penyoke field has been replaced by a kissing gate, and both the stiles further along this path have been replaced. The Bridleway sign at the west end of Paradise lane has been replaced, having been missing for many years and a horse- rider friendly latched gate has been provided.

The stiles on the footpath from the **Coombe to Wayton** have all been replaced with kissing gates, and the perilous stone steps at the Coombe end have all been relaid and a new handrail provided. This is now a lovely short walk for those whose knees are no longer able to climb stiles.

The County Council have also done invaluable work on the notorious problem on the “Silver path” at **Haye Farm**. Here they have cut through a Cornish bank and put in a swing gate so that we no longer have to climb through railings and cross a cattle collecting yard. When it was full of cows this could be an intimidating and smelly activity! We are overjoyed to have this lovely path back into easy use. The tenant at Haye Farm has sprayed the line of the path through his crops. It will be a great help to ensure you do not unintentionally stray from the path as you cannot always see the next marker.

The short footpath 11 that runs beside **Grove Farm** had a very dilapidated stile in the middle. Although it was not on the County Council work schedule, when we pointed out that this was in a dangerous state, they replaced the tread boards.

Lastly the Right of Way at the **Slipway Quay** has now been signposted and the misleading “Private” notices removed. I understand that The County Council have called this “FP15 from Fore Street, Cargreen to Thorn Point Ferry”, even though the ferry is long since extinct.

Do please get out and enjoy walking these beautiful paths. If you are in doubt of where they run, there are still copies of the excellent booklet “Walks around Landulph” available from Harold Bolt. (Tel. 844508).

**March** total 98.7 mm, highest 24-hour fall 20 mm on the 9<sup>th</sup>. March average 77.5 mm. Precipitation recorded on 20 days. During the 10<sup>th</sup> at 3.30 am in driving rain and severe S-SW gales barometric pressure fell to 970 millibars, one of the lowest ever recorded since records began at this location.

**April** total 57.1 mm, highest 24-hour fall 12.5 mm on the 29<sup>th</sup>. April average 85 mm. Precipitation recorded on 15 days.

## **Broadband 1 – light at the end?**

The Parish Council have been in touch with One Cornwall about the broadband situation and have been contacted by ActNow with the suggestion that we gather a petition from all those who would like to be able to get broadband and they will lobby the appropriate person in BT on our behalf.

## **Broadband 2 – no need for a phone lines!**

There is now a viable alternative to ADSL (phone line) broadband – 3G Mobile Broadband. This uses a device called a '**Dongle**' which plugs into a USB socket on your laptop or PC and works on a mobile phone signal. Currently signal seems to be available in most of Cargreen from both Vodafone and Orange and the price is about £15 per month.

The advantage of this route is that you can then use the dongle anywhere in the country where there is a signal. Speeds seem to be comparable with the sort of connection speed that those who are getting broadband here are experiencing (never more than 1Mbps)

Contracts are for 12, 18 & 24 months. Dongles are free if you sign up for a 2-yr contract, but if you want to talk to Vodafone go to PC World and speak to Kelly, giving her my name and she said there are ways around having to pay for the Dongle!

I have tried both Orange and Vodafone and find the Vodafone more straightforward. The downside is that it appears to be that the network is busier at the weekends (both Orange & Vodafone) and sometimes it's not possible to get to the website you want, but you can still send emails.

## Long Time Parish Residents

### Joyce Cox

Born Joyce Stidwell at Salter Mill (one of two children) Joyce, sister Peggy and the family moved into the village of Cargreen when she was 6 years old. Father was a farmer, working for Frank Barrett on land which included the area now covered by the houses at Coombe Lane

Home was in Back Lane at what later became known as Lane End Cottage, which was then two houses. Joyce attended Landulph School, and on leaving became the cook at the Spaniards Inn. One story she tells is of customers wanting salmon for their dinner, and this was obtained by walking out on the quay, and waving a tea towel at the boat fishermen who were always about in those days.

There were also more fish then, so they would drop one off for the visitors!

Wages were on the low side, her income being just £1 a week, and on leaving to work in Plymouth for Dingles, Joyce says she felt rich on her new salary of £6 a week. The memory of her interview for Dingles is still vivid since it took place on the day Princess Margaret was married.

Getting to work in those days was not just a matter of jumping in the car;

she had to find various ways of getting either into the City, or to Saltash Station, then the busiest in Cornwall. The grain lorry from Hoskings would often drop her, or Arnold Crabb who worked for Freemans, sometimes took her in for a 6.30 train. It was at the station she met future husband Alex Cox who was working there. Apparently the waiting room was sometimes so cold that the staff would “extract” a bucket of coal from the trains when they stopped, unknown to the footplate staff.

Following their marriage, Joyce came back to work on a farm in Landulph, often her days starting at 5am, cutting lettuce and finishing after 9 in the evening when she prepared flowers for sale. She claims to have “retired” early. She spent many years caring for her mother who lived at no 8 Church Lane, and tells of one day finding a neighbour, Mrs Metcalfe, in some distress, after which she spent much of her life looking after the lady, only to end up caring for the next occupant of the bungalow when she passed away. Hardly retired!

Joyce and Alex have been in their present house in Church Lane for some 38 years.
