Your guide to what's happening in the area

When Justin Arnold addressed February's Parish Council on development plans for the Spaniards Inn, the Annexe was full. Recognising the impact of the pub's closure, and in view of the likely interest by parishioners unable to attend the meeting, the newsletter group have invited Justin to provide a summary of intentions. We are happy to print this without comment or editorial change.

We thought that responses to our appeal for donations for the newsletter had dried up, but in mid-March we received a donation of £150, and now have a healthy £1,894 in the bank. Parish Council Meeting 15 February 2010

There were about 50 members of the public at this meeting, keen to hear Justin Arnold's statement on the future of the Spaniards Inn. Justin said that the financial future of the business would depend on new-built holiday accommodation supporting the non profit-making pub, and invited the public to the pub for further discussions. It was hoped that a definitive planning application would be lodged in about two months' time, taking account of inputs from the public.

Andrew opened the formal meeting with a statement from a published source, that the lengthening days would improve the public mood and chase away the winter blues, and was met by disbelieving harrumphs. However spirits soared, and many a manly heart skipped a beat when PC Rachel Short beamed her radiant news on villainy, citing a scatter of thefts from churches, and more particularly thefts of domestic heating oil. She said that Saltash Police Station alarmed sells padlocks for oil tanks for £8. Next day, my oil delivery man pointed out the three potential siphon points on top of my tank, only one of which was padlockable, but added that fitting a padlock would insurers persuade that all reasonable precautions had been taken, should one need to claim for oil theft. I hope that's helpful.

Parish Council Meeting 15 March 2010

The main business was dispatched briskly because of the added Annual Assembly. We learned that the parish now has volunteer Tree Wardens two (Valerie Taplin and Jane Hemens), that adjustable timers will be installed on the street lights in Hodders Way, that there are now seven parishioners keen to have allotments, and that the little lane beside Rose Cottage linking Fore Street with Hodders Way is not a Right of Way and therefore that unrestricted public access should not be assumed.

Police Constable Rachel Short briefed us on the Community Speed Watch initiative, in which trained volunteers will use speed guns to monitor vehicle behaviour and report infringements to local Police. Each of the first two offences will result in a warning, and after the third, the vehicle will be logged on the Police National Computer. She also mentioned a parallel system of monitoring using schoolchildren. Police under Despite supervision. her enthusiasm and charm, it was clear to the dullest student of body language that the scheme had no appeal to councillors or public alike. One can't help wondering what sort of blighted personality would volunteer for this scheme in a quiet rural community, but I'm not allowed to express a view.

Planning: Council recommended approval for:

Construction of garage, store and w.c. Paulesda, Landulph; re-stated its objections to:

Construction of dwelling and associated parking, Penyoke Lane, Cargreen;

and felt unable to advise on:

tree surgery, 17 Hodders Way, Cargreen.

Annual Assembly: Mr Simon Swales, Community Network Manager, gave a brief overview of the value of Parish Plans, and in particular encouraged the authors of Landulph's new Plan to take account of neighbouring parish initiatives, to have both short and long-term perspectives, to make no assumptions about affordability, and to take inspiration from the excellence of the current Plan. Having thanked Mr Swales. Andrew Butcher said that he hoped to have the new plan issued by November. Several members of the public signed up to join the Parish Plan Steering Group while all enjoyed hot drinks, buns and a blether.

Landulph Memorial Hall

On hearing there was to be an EGM, I thought, as a user of the Hall since 1974, I would try to learn more about the management of the Hall.

What follows is gleaned from various people who have helped run the Hall in the past;

- The Hall is a charity.
- There is Management Committee and all members of the Management Committee are Trustees of the Hall.
- All organisations that use the hall are invited to send a representative to the Management Committee. It would appear that this is potentially a large committee.
- The Fund Raising Committee that was part of Management was suspended earlier this year.
- Biggest expenditure is on-going costs such as heating and lighting £2,076; insurance £1,366; cleaning £1,109- figures taken from 2009 accounts.
- The surplus for 2008 was £4,760 and for 2009 £254

• Over the life of the hall we have received grants in excess of £100,000. I hope this may help you to understand that the Hall needs your help, whether as a chairperson, secretary, committee member, supporter or fundraiser.

When this plan is finalised you will find that Cargreen has a viable pub, with each individual part enjoying the rewards of its own work.

This development will give the community of Cargreen a new lease of life, attracting new residents to a riverside village with a viable pub and giving current residents a pub they can moor alongside and enjoy any time of year. 
