

Parish Council Meeting 21 June 2010

Sometimes our councillors, let alone their admiring audience, can be taken by surprise by the unexpected matters that jump out at them from a dull agenda. For example, when discussing the state of repair of the **equipment on the playing field**, the council clerk warned that one annual inspection might not be regarded as duly diligent if there were a claim following injury or death, and that the councillors could find themselves judged guilty of corporate homicide and uninsured. Councillors will now undertake monthly inspections.

More shocks followed... conditions attaching to council's ownership of the **telephone box** lay down standards for care and repair, and while discussing these it emerged that similar boxes were changing hands on eBay for up to £1,500. Suddenly council realised that if villains nicked the box or if it were seriously damaged, they would be responsible for repairs, so agreed to insure the box for £1,500.

The clerk then informed council that **hedge cutting** alongside the roads was the responsibility of landowners (County Council being responsible for verges). Our parish council's usual policy of ordering and paying for hedge cutting at Highdown was therefore inappropriate. Council will now liaise with landowners throughout the parish on this matter. Landowners will also be approached to see if there is any land in the parish that could be leased to the council with a view to its use for **allotments**.

Council is now reassured that the **cricket club** is maintaining the pavilion (previously a chalet at Whitsand), has adequate third party insurance, and is happy with its loos. A small increase in the rent was agreed. There was good news too on **future broadband services**, with precise details not yet available, but broad targets are described at:

Parish Council Meeting 19th July 2010

Holy Moly, more surprises. Noting that growths of **knotweed and ragwort** in Church Lane had been reported to Highways Department, George said that the rarity of cuckoos might be due in part to control of ragwort, because the Cinnabar Moth laid its eggs exclusively on ragwort, its caterpillars thrived on the otherwise toxic plant, and cuckoo fledglings depended on these caterpillars when they left the step-parents' nest. So, less ragwort = less cuckoos. Talk about unintended consequences!

Later in the meeting, **George's resignation** from the council was accepted with regret and good wishes for his future...more unintended consequences of a youthful romance (it's a long story). It being the aim of our new government to reduce the number

of MPs, parliamentary constituencies will have to enlarge. A possibility is now being addressed that Saltash and adjacent parishes might be absorbed into a **Plymouth constituency**. Our parish council will oppose this for a variety of good reasons, including the tentative perception that Devon's boundary might have to cross the Tamar to embrace the constituency, and we might then be adopted by a Devon Local Authority.

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
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Barry Richards

One of the oldest families in the Parish, the Richards family has been traced back some four generations. Barry was born at Pentillie during the war years, son of Horace and Doris Richards who had a smallholding.

He attended "Cross College" (the name by which the school in Landulph was then known) and continuing his education at Buckland found himself with three choices of career. An accomplished pianist and artist, Barry chose agriculture for his future and went into partnership with father Horace. He puts his ability to imagine some of the beautiful garden layouts he has been responsible for down to his artistic side, but felt at the time that his future lay in the family business. An astonishing statistic he quotes is that the family was at one point growing a total of 96 different crops, which were sent to market in Plymouth.

Barry felt that one of the ways to expand his business in the late 60's was to build greenhouses and with his wife Karen developed the business known as Highcroft Nurseries. Carnations formed a large part of the business, but even with greenhouses it was a risky job and on three occasions, the whole crop was virtually destroyed. One winter was so cold that the blooms all froze in spite of oil fired heating. On another occasion, a severe gale destroyed all but one of 17 houses of crops, and each of these events set the company back about three



years and almost resulted in total loss.

With his expertise in marketing, the decision was made to import flowers from all parts of the world, and over the following years Barry built up strong relationships with growers from as far apart as Columbia and Israel. It is his insistence on only the best quality, that have led to him becoming internationally known as a grower, and he has supplied special blooms to among others HRH the Queen Mother, and featured on BBC Gardener's World.

Outside the business, Barry has always been a keen sportsman, and was captain of both Landulph and Callington cricket teams, St Mellion Snooker and played table tennis in the top Plymouth league.

A passion is shooting, starting as a beater, Barry then became a first class shot, and he, wife Karen and son Darren shot for Cornwall at the same team.

Barry is one of those local residents who seem so immersed in their work that retirement seems unthinkable. Each year, the family opens their garden of some three acres. Not only does this give the public an opportunity to see a very special garden, but helps the National Gardens Scheme, an organization which the family are delighted to support.

In recent years Barry has championed the support of "Local Growing", as he says "if there is to be a best in the world, why shouldn't we grow it locally!"

The Cargreen Wreck is Removed



In a flurry of activity on Saturday 3 July, the half-sunk yacht on a mooring off Cargreen was lifted and removed. It had been creating a mild hazard to navigation since it sank in February. A salvage barge belonging to Riverman Services of Torpoint did the work which was not without problems. The barge struggled to break the yacht free of its mud tomb and once it was clear, they could only raise it to just below water level. They dragged the boat down river for disposal with a few stops along the way as it grounded again on the various shallow bits off Weir Point.

We seem to have quite a few more glow worms this summer --- they obviously like this dry sunny weather too --- hanging out along our causeway deep in the long grass, the girls flashing their tail-lights as soon as it's dark and hoping for a nice young handsome glow worm chappy to turn up and fall in love so they can lay their eggs --- --and then die. (A sad romance!) No wonder the chaps don't bother flashing. The larvae can flash too but only very faintly and in a rather intermittent fashion. I wonder if anyone else has spotted any glow worms in their gardens or hedges-rows?

Not so many house martins this year, but they seem to be steaming away on a second brood, so may be making up the numbers. In fact most of our garden birds are producing young as fast as they can. The reed buntings that fed on the wall during the harsh winter, with the sparrows, dunno, blackbird, finches and robin seem to have a big healthy looking family. Lots of singing in the Marsh anyway.
