### Parish Council Meeting 20 December 2010

"And the snow lay round about..." A lot of time in an otherwise hollow meeting was spent discussing how the parish could cope better with snow and ice. Chairman Andrew Butcher explained that in the next financial year Cornwall Council would no longer take responsibility for topping up grit bins in the parish, or would do so only for a price. It would retain responsibility for gritting only the principal road access to the village, but would need to be advised that the road that passes Stockadon is the one to go for. As a short term improvement, council agreed to try to provide a bin plus grit for use by

Fore Street residents, and in the longer term to create a parish-wide strategy for gritting which allowed for some local purchasing and decision-making.

After the meeting, council and eight members of the public enjoyed mince pies and sherry, before declaring the draft Parish Plan a creation of unrivalled gorgeousness, apart from advising that it should attend to Emergency Planning and (wait for it) Road Gritting. The meeting ended without mention of refreshments at January's session, but a brandy and ginger would hit the spot. What's yours?

### Parish Council Meeting 17th January 2011

This two-hour meeting did not cover a lot of ground, but from time to time it minutely dissected issues that on a summer's evening might have been dismissed impatiently in favour of a Pimm's on the lawn. The graceful lady constable came to tell us that police cover may be reduced in rural areas and that

there had been no crime in the parish recently, so that's all right. She was asked what could be done to stop huge commercial vehicles being sat-nav'd to Ziggerson Hill and said that the police could not help, but could close the road to all traffic if it were unsafe e.g. due to snow. Council

hopes to have “Narrow road” signs erected on the single-lane approaches to the parish, and is in dispute with County over costs. The road gritting strategy is evolving reassuringly. I’m less impressed with our council’s ability to erect a simple sign at the cricket field with the legend ‘Searle Family Memorial Field’ as promised in 2007 when the field was gifted to them. At least they had got to the stage of having a slate slab inscribed, but the mason’s tool caused a stab wound rather than an incision, ruined the slate, and raised a rueful laugh from the councillors who should by now be feeling quite spooked.

**Planning.** Council recommended refusal for:

Construction of dwelling and associated parking, Penyoke, Cargreen.

Council asked for deferral of decision (more information needed) for:

Retention of siting of mobile steel storage containers, Long Orchard, Landulph.

These decisions were not arrived at lightly and involved the sort of long and meandering exchanges which are best conducted from deep leather armchairs in an aroma of Havanas and Islay’s finest. For example, when discussing Long Orchard, council was puzzled by County-level Planning and Enforcement Officers’ reluctance to divulge some helpful information, and found themselves in need of basic facts about the nature of the business activities, traffic flows, site development and so on, and moved on almost seamlessly to muse on the need to set the hounds of officialdom on possible irregular constructions in a nearby field. Your round I think, Sir Humphrey.

If anyone wants to hire the hall and use them, this can be arranged.

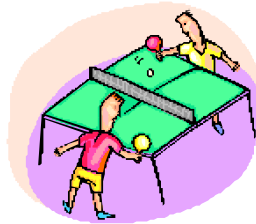

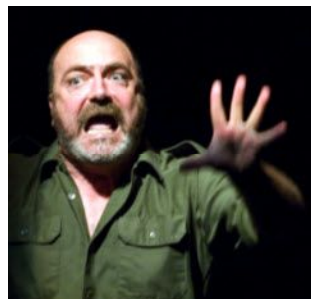

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## Landulph Film Club's End of Winter Season

Landulph Film Club continues its season with two more great films:

### February 8

*The Odd Couple* (1968) is a very funny comedy film, brilliantly played by Jack Lemmon and Walter Matthau. It is the story of two divorced men – Felix Ungar, the neurotic neatfreak, and Oscar Madison, the fun-loving slob – who decide to live together, even though their personalities clash. The film was written by Neil Simon, based on his play of the same name directed by Gene Saks.



### March 8

*The Madness of King George* (1994) directed by Nicholas Hytner and adapted by Alan Bennett from his own play, *The Madness of George III*. It tells the true story of George III's deteriorating mental health, and his equally declining relationship with his son, the Prince of Wales, particularly focusing on the period around the Regency Crisis of 1788. Modern medicine has suggested that the King's symptoms were the result of acute intermittent porphyria. The film is notable for brilliant acting by Nigel Hawthorne and Helen Mirren, and won three BAFTA Awards.

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Most roof-mounted solar panels use the sun to heat water which can be stored, but photovoltaic (PV) panels use light to generate electricity which can be used immediately or sold to the national grid. Several residents have already installed PV panels on their roofs, with a good few more poised to follow.

There is currently a very attractive incentive scheme: the government pays householders for the electricity they produce from PV panels they have installed on their roofs. The present feed-in tariff is guaranteed for 25 years, index-linked, and is tax-free. As a guide, a typical 2kW system would cost about £9,000 to install. It would supply electricity for household use, saving about £300 on your electricity bill, and also earn about £826 p.a. tax-free from electricity sold to the grid. Overall that saves about £1,100 p.a., roughly equivalent to about 12%

rate of return on investment. The capital is also guaranteed as it sits, securely, silently and unobtrusively, on your roof.

Along with a few other households, we plan to take advantage of this scheme shortly, and would be happy to tell you more about it and our group discount. Full details on PV are at [www.energysavingtrust.org.uk](http://www.energysavingtrust.org.uk).

PV is definitely in the air this spring. At the recent Public Consultation Display in the Memorial Hall, there was overwhelming support for the Solar Park planned around the Electricity Sub-station at West Kingsmill. If approved, this should generate enough electricity to power 1000 homes. Whether or not this goes ahead, we can all do our bit in the meantime, while we can still benefit from the government's generous feed-in tariffs.
