Parish Council Matters

At the Council meeting on 18th January, we began with a presentation by Andrew George, Director of the Cornwall Community Land Trust about affordable housing. A CLT is a community-led organisation providing land and buildings to meet the long term needs of that community. This includes building affordable homes for locals. Membership of a CLT is open to everyone in the community, so everyone can have a say on what happens.

In Cornwall, successful CLT's have been set up in St Just-in-Roseland, Delabole and St Minver, for example. Where a community may be too small to set up its own CLT, it may enter into an arrangement with another adjacent parish, or work with the Cornwall CLT directly.

Cornwall CLT housing projects are community led, but with Cornwall CLT taking on the initial risk on their behalf. The homes are sold at less than two thirds of the markets price, or rented at a discount. Such homes are reserved to meet local housing needs for ever, and are designed to be low carbon homes that are cheap to run.

Andrew George pointed out that the starting point in considering setting up a CLT is to carry out housing needs survey. The Council is considering this, so watch this space.

Otherwise, the Council's deliberations were not exciting, covering such matters as a planning application, the procurement of a laptop and other electronics to enable paperless planning applications to be shown on the big screen in the Hall Annexe, and receiving a report on the activities of

the Saltash Area Road Safety Committee.

The Council was pleased to note the progress of the neighbourhood planning group and the successful consultation process which had just been completed.

Finally, we still have a vacancy for a parish councillor, and this has the potential to cause problems; for example we are often very nearly inquorate when considering planning applications.

There is the facility to publicise community groups and forthcoming events, but to date only the Festival Association appears under the community groups section and the only forthcoming events listed are Parish Council meetings. It would appear to be an easy enough process to list an upcoming event or to add a community group to the website. It's a simple on-line form which is submitted to the Clerk to the Parish Council. Once approved, your event or group will appear on the website.

It's another source of information about the Parish; it's free publicity for groups and events and given the visitor statistics it shouldn't be sniffed at. I'm not suggesting that the website should become the leading source of information for what's going on in the Parish; there's the excellent diary in these very pages and the wonderfully named "Landulph Innit" facebook page both of which are capable of reaching different audiences. This is just another medium to reach a potentially different set of people. If you are involved in organising an event or a member of a community group why don't you give the website a go and spread your net wider. Let's see what the numbers say this time next year...

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Landulph Film previews

The next two Film Club offerings are about two very different people from different eras and both of them are part of our history.

The February film is about Belle whose 18th century portrait once hung in Hampstead's Kenwood House. The film was inspired by the 1779 painting of Dido Elizabeth Belle, the illegitimate daughter of a Royal Navy captain, John Lindsay, and an African woman, Maria Belle . She was raised at Kenwood House by her great-uncle, Lord Mansfield, then Lord Chief Justice of England. The film is a powerful, moving and gently subversive romantic melodrama about a woman out of time.

The Ides of March bring forth Benedict Cumberbatch as Alan Turing in The Imitation Game. A handsomely engrossing and poignantly melancholic thriller from Norwegian director Morten Tyldum who serves up a rollicking code-cracking wartime thriller laced with an astringent cyanide streak. It was the mathematical genius of Alan Turing that enabled Britain to crack the German military codes during WW II and, it is said, shortened the war by some two years. The film tells the story both of the man, Turing, and the place, Bletchley Park who were Britain's secret weapon. *John Hall*



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Peter du Plessis

Richard Hosking, a lifelong friend has sent us this appreciation of Peter du Plessis who died in November last year.

'I give this eulogy with great affection for the Du Plessis family. It was with great sadness that I heard that Peter had passed away. What a life it had been!

'In 1955 Peter met a young lady called Fay Powell-Thomas. Faye had started training at the R C Infirmary. He had started farming at Marsh Farm in the early 50s, and went into partnership with his brother Dan keeping pedigree Landrace pigs. I can remember my father telling me how he used to go to Marsh to buy weaners. Peter's father for a joke used to let the sow out and it chased him as he was loading the piglets! Pigs came to an end and in the late 50s they started the Daffodil business. 'In May 1958 Faye qualified as SRN and worked at St Barnabas Hospital, the proud owner of an engagement ring! In December 1961 the family home became available and plans were made for a wedding in February 1962 at this church on a very cold day. Following the wedding they enjoyed a honeymoon in Weston-Super-Mare and North Wales travelling in a Morris 1000 pick-up. In July 1963 Anne was born - I'm told to keep the Jack Russell *Titan* company!

'In 1970 his aunts came back from Australia and wanted to return to their home. Dan and Eileen invited Peter and Faye back to live at Marsh. Times were hard and Faye applied for a job at Callington as a district nurse with a car provided.

'By this time Peter and Dan's daffodil business was growing, and tons of bulbs were being sold to Trago Mills. I well remember the acres of cauliflowers, anemones as well as the eucalyptus and pittosporum being marketed by Star Pack of which Peter's brother David was manager. 'In 1982 planning consent was given for a bungalow in Church Lane. Peter and Fay moved to their new home, *Wadavers*, in 1985. In 1987 there was a big family party to celebrate a Silver Wedding and Ruby Wedding for Dan and Eileen and Jean and John.

'In 1990 Dan and Eileen had started to build their bungalow in Church Lane and notice was given to the Duchy to quit Marsh Farm which gave Peter and Fay the opportunity to travel to see relatives in South Africa and to travel to many interesting places.

'In 1991 granddaughter Lyndsey was born followed by Matthew in 1996 who gave Peter great pleasure and amusement.

'With great sadness he left the parish, ending 300 years of family association with church and village, to move into a bungalow in Saltash to be near his daughter Anne.'

Apple Orchard Wassail Comes to Landulph

Tickets were a sell out, the weather had miraculously turned to dry and all was set for the Cargreen Cancer Research Committee's first fundraising event of 2016 – an orchard wassail. Even an injury to one of the hosts, leaving him in a plaster cast, wasn't going to interrupt proceedings.



On Saturday 16 January, led by Dave Ledger, The Green Man, and entertained by Morris dancers, The Cornish Wreckers, families and friends from near and far gathered in the orchard at the home of Mary and Philip Braund, to drive away evil spirits and encourage a bumper crop in 2016. Those residents in the Coombe Lane/Coombe Drive area may have wondered what all the hullaballoo was about - it was the sound of a mere 120

people banging saucepans and generally making as much noise as possible. Those trees should be positively laden come September! After all their exertions, the crowd were keen to sample the homemade wassail cider, and if that didn't make them forget about the cold, then the BBQ and hot chocolate drinks in the marquee certainly did.

As far as we know, this was the first wassail event in Landulph. However, ancient records show many orchards in the parish so maybe we don't have exclusivity after all! What was a 'toe in the water' event actually

Where are the milking cows?

I'm grateful to farmers Richard Hosking and Richard Brown for helping me understand why there is now only one Landulph farm with a dairy herd, while they could remember seventeen farms in active milk production in earlier years. When these men were youngsters, dairy herds were guite small with between 20 and 40 cows. In the second half of the 20th century the old routines of dairy farming had to respond to new regulations on hygiene, animal welfare, TB testing, rising wages, and advances in nutrition, breeding and mechanised milking. Gone were the days of hand-milking and virtually all farms were now using some form of milking machine, perhaps able to milk just one or two cows at a time and needing the collected milk to be carried from the cowshed to the dairy by hand for filtering, cooling and storage in 45 litre churns to await collection the next day. Other systems were developing which could milk many cows simultaneously and pipe the milk straight into the farm dairy. This automation advanced rapidly in sophistication and expense. Among other factors, the UK's membership of the EU in 1973 had a major impact on farming practices with generous subsidies to encourage productivity. This bonanza enabled farmers to expand and invest, but in the face of the ensuing 'butter mountains and milk lakes' the EU imposed milk quotas and penalties for overproduction. Then along came the supermarkets with their massive combined buying power and cut-throat competition so it is no surprise that small dairy farmers sold their herds. Then what happened? Obviously some farmhouses and outbuildings were sold for other uses including conversion to dwellings. However the land remains, with pasture now supporting larger beef herds and sheep rather than dairy, more cereal and silage growing, livery stables, and solar parks. Elsewhere in the south-west camp sites, caravan parks and other tourist attractions have mushroomed, but not here thank goodness. (To see how a modern automated milking parlour works, visit YouTube and search for 'milking parlour': it's amazing!)
