Parish Council, April

Planning Battery Energy Storage sites are like buses..... none for ages, then several come at once. Conrad Energy want to build another one north west of the Elbridge electricity substation. Councillors had been shown around the site and were generally positive, but with comments. Western Power seem to be letting 4 contracts (one grid stability and three battery sites) around the substation with no thought about access; in fact seemingly without telling each contractor of the other three's existence! All four therefore proposed separate access tracks. A co-ordinated access and transport plan was essential.

Conrad Energy's plans retained a public footpath through the site, but the AONB dislike kissing gates and stiles – bad for disabled access. How a wheelchair user will manage the very steep slope behind the site is anybody's guess.

The proposal to build two houses behind an existing house at the crossroads had been refused by County Planning, but the proposer has appealed. Unfortunately the grounds for appeal are not visible, and with no further information the PC could not change their comments. The PC supported the Planning Officer's decision.

Memorial Hall Staging The Memorial Hall committee is happy to take responsibility for the stage extensions, (as proposed last month) and will insure it. The staging will remain available for loan by other village groups.

Climate Action Group The Climate Action Group (CAG) had considered the conundrum discussed at the last meeting concerning the status of the group in relation to the PC. They agreed that the group should remain a Working Group under the PC, and as such would refer decisions to the PC for ratification. The Instagram account would remain active, but the Clerk had the login details should any moderation be required. There was a separate report defining the group's future focus. One initiative (which interests me) is 'No Mow May'!

Community orchard The Community Orchard comes under the CAG, and they reported on progress. The 'long term commitment' by the Duchy had been queried, and the response indicated that 'long term' in Duchy-speak was based on its existence since 1337, so it would see us out. A site visit and working day took place on 8 May – in pouring rain! A Working Group is planned (2 councillors, 6 parishioners). Playing Field The PC would like something new and exciting to replace 3 broken pieces of equipment. One quote for repair has been received, but a second, for new equipment containing only locally recycled plastic, is expected.

Housing Needs Survey Councillor Tagg has re-analysed the data to separate Landulph from Botus and Hatt. A draft is awaiting approval from the Affordable Housing Team before it can be published. Responses from those claiming to require affordable homes needed their qualifying needs validating (both local and financial).

Parish Council, May Parish Assembly

The annual Parish Assembly summarised the Council's major events and achievements. This year's assembly was preceded by a talk from the Tamara Landscape Partnership, reported elsewhere in this newsletter.

The Parish Council Chair gave an impressive list of the council's achievements and participation in parish and county affairs. The list is long, but highlights include the new bus services to Cargreen, the activities of the Climate Action Group and the Housing Needs Survey. Parish Council Meeting

Applications for the vacant councillor post had been received. Voting was postponed until the next meeting to allow applicants to attend. **Planning** There was a resubmission of an expired application for an agricultural building at Clampit Farm. The Council felt it was oversized, highly visible and too close to the adjacent home. It recommended refusal.

Despite lacking full documentation the Council approved overhead power lines from Tinnel to Clifton (on the headland opposite Weir Quay) where there is no mains electricity. It was felt to be a worthwhile proposal.

Outline approval for a four-bed house in the garden of the White House was refused. The building was considered very large for the space available and plans for access were unclear. Conversion of a barn at Ellbridge to a holiday let was approved.

Finally, yet another pre-application for a battery storage facility at the electricity substation had been received and there is yet another even bigger one in the pipeline! The council are very unhappy about the apparently un-coordinated approach and want to understand the strategic picture from Western Power.

Climate Action Group Recommendations from the group this month included promoting 'No-Mow May' with the Gardening Club (gets my vote) and the creation of a public wild flower area.

The Community Orchard Working Group is now formed. As LPCAG is so difficult to say, they have chosen the shorter acronym LOG



(Landulph Orchard Green). Opening day will be Wassailing Day, 17 January 2024. It should involve singing to the trees (which are not yet there). In the meantime, grants are being sought for gates, water tanks and piping. The Council will provide first aid kits – can't start work without those!

Playing Field The Council approved buying a new ramp/net climber and an activity trail made from recycled local plastic to replace dangerous equipment. The cost is about £15,000, which will be met from reserves. The slide area has a year or two's life left in it, and the PC will make a grant application to replace these with a castle and rota-net. *Ed note: work on installing the new equipment was starting as we went to press.*

Housing Needs Survey Councillor Tagg presented her re-analysed data. The report was approved and will be published, but highlights include:

- 28 respondents want affordable housing, but 9 live outside the parish.
- 23 of these declared a qualifying need (eg worked locally)
- Only three are on the affordable housing register.
- The most important local services are regarded as school and public transport.

AOB Although the flowers donated by Barry Richards for the Coronation

Broadcast were magnificent, some of the Memorial Hall vases had gone missing. The perennial issue of hedge cutting arose. With so much rain, the hedgerows are proliferating. The PC is not responsible for hedge cutting but does so anyway in the interests of safety. Cutting is normally done at the end of June, but the PC agreed to ask the normal contractor to start at the beginning of June this time. Peter Plume

Landulph group visits 'green' farm

Earlier this year the Landulph Parish Climate Action Group (LPCAG) showed the film *Food for Thought,* which featured Tim Williams' farm at Erth Barton who spoke at the screening. Last month, LPCAG members and others from Landulph and Saltash Environment Action visited the farm. Jo Butcher was part of the farm walk. This is what she discovered: Regenerative farming – what is it? Soil is what it's all about,

- Healthy soil
- · Soil that will grow good grass
- Soil that has lots of healthy microbes and captures carbon
- Soil that holds moisture and helps to prevent flooding and increases biodiversity (lots of butterflies and insects).

Tim is an evangelical regenerative farmer with boundless energy who not only manages the farm but together with his wife has opened the MAAM coffee shop at Crocadon, St Mellion. It was interesting to see the diverse mix of plants, which included grasses, chicory, clovers, burnet and birds foot trefoil that make up the fields on which the cattle feed, and to hear about the finances and practicalities of farming rgeneratively. LANDULPH ORCHARD GREEN

In the February/March issue of the newsletter you will have read about the possibility of a community orchard on land made available for the long term by the Duchy of Cornwall via the tenant farmers, the Best family. A grant from Farming in Protected Landscapes (FIPL) has been received for 60 trees and fencing of the site. Further grants are available for other items as they become required.

Following the March meeting of people who were interested in the idea, a Working Group of the Parish Council was set up offering relevant skills to consider how to make the land, two fields near the church, best serve the parish. Terms of reference and risk assessment were written, schedule of work and safeguarding are in the pipeline, together with water and soil surveys. Once completed, a design study will be done with the support of Natural Landscape (formerly AONB).

Tamar Valley Update

Footpath to divert through Landulph This summer a new 90-mile Coast to Coast footpath is being launched largely following the Tamar from Mount Edgecombe to Bude with a boulder marking the source of the Tamar. The main route sometimes strays into Devon but there will be a Cornish alternative that passes through Landulph. To avoid the A388, a new permissive path has been opened on Pentillie land running through the fields connecting the old road at Vinegar Hill with the road to Halton Quay.

At the Parish Assembly on 15 May, Gary Lewis, Senior Heritage Officer of the Tamara Landscape Partnership gave an update on this five-year lottery funded project and the opportunities for Landulph to contribute to other heritage plans.

Another exciting development expected this summer is a new electric ferry across the Tamar at Calstock and to Cotehele. So far there are no firm plans for this to extend to Cargreen but Martin Worth, Parish Council Chairman says 'watch this space'.

Heritage projects Community involvement with heritage projects is just starting and anyone interested should send their details to gary.lewis@cornwall.gov.uk. Many of the events are taking place at the Tamar Valley Centre and I will try and include these in monthly Parish Council email. Projects that may be of interest are:

- Mapping the quays and river crossings
- Loading historic records into Cornwall Council's historic interactive map there is a workshop on this in July
- Uploading pictures and other documents into the county archive, Kresen Kernow, at Redruth
- Story telling about the Tamar by school children this is being trialled during the summer but Tamara would like all primary schools to be involved as well as pre-school and teenagers
- Interviews as part of an oral history package if anyone would like to contribute to this please volunteer to be interviewed about aspects of life in the valley.

The launch of Landulph's new scheduled bus service has proved popular with parishioners. Phillida Jermain was one of the first to make use of it. She describes her experience.

We caught the bus outside our front door (Tamarisk in Fore Street), and all enjoyed the journey, looking out for lambs and being brushed on either side by flowering wild garlic as we took in Botus Fleming on the way.

'We arrived at Saltash leisure centre at 10am where an aquarobics class provided entertainment for us while we enjoyed drinks and home -made cakes until the pool was free. The swim was fun – enough people to make it interesting but room to do lengths if you wanted. By the time we were out and dried, lunch was on people's minds, so back to the food area in the leisure centre where there was a good lunch choice including a nice fresh salad, and of course those cakes and

biscuits or ice cream to round off the meal! The threatened rain had obligingly fallen while we were inside, so we walked into Saltash and fell on the factory outlet shop at the top of Fore Street – the days of exploring the excellent equipment in the nearby playground are sadly over. All too soon we were outside the shop hailing the bus home. The day was voted a great success and is definitely on the list of activities for their next visit. 'One of our fellow travellers used the bus to enable her to work in one of the Saltash charity shops, and another stepped off our bus and straight onto another to take him into Plymouth. He was looking forward to spending time on the Hoe and enjoying an Italian lunch. Others I know link up with trains to Looe, Exeter and elsewhere. No worries



about parking – hooray! – as well as having the knowledge that one fewer car was on the roads and we were making use of a bus that was coming out to the village anyway on the school run.'

that's how temperate rainforests are imagined. Landulph is lucky; ours are easy to find and easily accessible. Landulph has all the ingredients needed for a rainforest to flourish; a warm south-westerly prevailing wind keeps our temperatures comparatively high throughout the year. We have a notoriously high rainfall, keeping our multitude of springs running through most of the year. You can find seepage from those springs almost everywhere from the high ground down towards the watercourses. Those watercourses have cut deep hollows into the ground and if the greenery in those hollows has remained untamed for a long time, there's the chance for a rainforest to grow.

Here in Landulph, we have several forests, all slightly different (that's 'forest' in the old sense of 'wild place' rather than of acres of serried commercial conifers). In this account I focus on three widely varying sites, all of them easy to get to and inspect.

The smallest is in the hollow lane ascending from the Coombe towards

Salter Mill. Clearly a steep hill cut down to help horses over the brow, the sides are near vertical; the west rough rock and soil and cloaked with thick moss. Pennywort, small ferns and other tiny plants grow here, courtesy of the water and nutrients dripping down the sphagnum-like moss.

The second and most unusual is on the Tamar foreshore. You'll find it as you head South from the playing field towards Neal Point. It stretches for no more than a couple of hundred yards, so there's no need for wellies; just aim for the last of any ebb tide. The tides have undercut the cliff along here. Water runs down much of the face from the fields above in rivulets or in steady drips. Strands of ivy and bramble hang down in mid-air and there are patches of algae (these plant-names are approximate; I'm not a botanist!) in orange, sulphurous yellow and harsh green. Best of all, for me, was finding a patch of what looked like minuscule watercress, close-growing and with perfect leaves the size of a pinhead. I didn't taste it, nor did I try the water, clear though it looked. The air in this close space is stuffy and a degree or two warmer than elsewhere. It can be creepy.

The third is the biggest and richest and beloved by many Landulphians. It's the hollow at the bottom of Ziggarson, where streams meet in a

There are two defibrillators located within our parish, both for public use in an emergency.

- 1. Landulph Memorial Hall in Fore Street
- 2. Cargreen Yacht Club, Coombe Lane.

Landulph Memorial Hall defibrillator:

Located adjacent to front doors

To use you are required to input the code 1111 to unlock, and press the green 'tick' button to open for access.

Cargreen Yacht Club defibrillator

Located on the front wall of the building before you reach the front doors.

This unit is left unlocked, and so no unlock code is required.

Please remember in the event that you may need to use one of the above units, that in a cardiac arrest situation: **continuous CPR is essential while someone else goes to obtain the defibrillator.**
