Parish Council meeting February 2017

Our previous edition reported that the Rectory Room and the School were ineligible for awards from the Solar Park fund. On further investigation it emerged that the school PTA as a stand-alone charity is sufficiently separate from the school to have eligibility, so later in the meeting it was awarded £3,743 ex VAT for repairs and improvements to an outdoor play/teaching shelter. With equal pleasure the Council agreed to release £3,721 for Penyoke play park maintenance and repairs. After completion of the agreed work future costs will be borne fully by the Parish Council. Fascinatingly, the Rectory Room bid proved difficult not just because it may be a religious building but also because proof of ownership is nowhere to be found.

The chairman confirmed that the Council is powerless to prevent new street name signs in the village (Penyoke Lane) carrying both English and Cornish identifiers. According to Mr Google there are about 300 fluent Cornish speakers in Cornwall, while the second commonest spoken language in Cornwall is Polish, with about 1980 speakers (and for all we know Cantonese may not be far behind). I propose that our street signs have artistic Chinese ideograms rather than Cornish gobbledegook. All those in favour....

Work to start on overhead electricity lines

Parishioners will have noticed the scaffolding towers being erected under one of the pylon runs from Ellbridge. This is to enable to the National Grid to trial a new high-visibility paint on the cables which, they hope, will reduce the risk of aircraft colliding with the cables. This is one of several measures being introduced to facilitate the reopening of Plymouth Airport. Supporters of the airport hope this action will bring the chances of reviving the facility one step nearer.

The plan is to paint the wires in the run from the sub-station at Ellbridge all the way to Roborough Down north of Plymouth in a vivid day-glow yellow colour; the paint will also be treated to glow in the dark to assist night time air traffic. Work is due to commence on 1 April and is expected to last for 14 weeks.

Landulph plan progress

The Landulph Neighbourhood Plan Group has published the results of its survey conducted recently. The analysis can be seen on its website, landulphplan.org or on the Facebook page landulph Innit. It is well worth reading with some interesting and surprising statistics.

The Group is currently revising the plan to accommodate the views of parishioners. It will then be submitted for a second series of consultations later this year before the final version is released.

This spring term has been extremely positive and optimistic at Landulph School. Among a number of visits was one by Class 3 to a science and technology show case at Plymouth University. This trip was organised by saltash.net for our children and free for all parents.

For World Book Day the whole school dressed in costume as characters from their favourite books. The day culminated in a grand story telling session; the children created and presented stories based on our school values and finally swapped their favourite books with each other, promoting a love of reading.

We are developing as a Thrive School, a programme for individuals, groups or even whole classes to support well-being and development. We have a play therapist who is working individually with some of our younger children. Another initiative is 'Drawing and Talking' which allows children the time to talk through worries or problems. We are very proud of our pastoral care and believe that our children are very well supported.



Eighty-two per cent of our children take part in extra-curricular clubs and activities which take place in and out of school hours. Some are sporty, others are artv and techy; the aim is to provide something for everyone! All but one of the clubs are provided free of charge by members of staff and volunteer parents.



The Working Group reviewed last year's park inspection and identified improvements that needed to be done to get the park in top condition ready for the summer. This work (replacing rotten timbers, reproofing etc) will be funded via the solar park grant and will take place in late April. And what about the tractor? Jack and the Beanstalk

Gales of laughter swept Landulph Hall when the pantomime Jack and the Beanstalk played to capacity audiences on two evenings at the beginning of February. This was the first Landulph panto with adult performers that most parishioners could remember. The idea of a panto has been discussed for years but it took the impresario drive and talent of teacher Sally Worth, and her sound and light wizard husband Martin, backed by the Festival Committee, finally to bring it to the Memorial Hall stage. All the traditional ingredients were there in the professional script. However, the real entertainment was in the additions penned by cast and backstage staff satirising local issues and personalities. Considerable ad libbing, both intentional and unintentional, added to the hilarity. The two evenings differed considerably in style, with Saturday night's offering significantly more 'family friendly'.

The cast was brilliantly lead by Jason Small, in his first ever acting role, as Jack. He expertly orchestrated the traditional hissing, booing, cheering and cries of 'he's behind you...!'. Nicola Small appropriately and sweetly played Princess Jill, the love of Jack's life.

A revelation to his friends and neighbours was David Ford as Dame Effy Cashus, Jack's flamboyantly dressed Mum. Marcia Pirie was evil personified oozing around the stage as Uriah Creep. Inspired casting produced a suave Prince Charming from Allen Pack and a gentle giant with an Irish accent by Con O'Connor.

With a cast of 27 it would be impossible to mention all, but the audiences were treated to a special comedic delight by Sue Hassan and Andrea Edwards as the hip side-kicks MC Wickiwickiwickid and Innit. Gary Edwards and Mark Shirlaw were udderly brilliant as Maisy the Cow. The younger generation also shone with confident performances from Amelie Wilkes as the fairy and her supporters Hollie Lavis and Evie Pearson. A bravura cameo by Daniel Sissons promised a bright acting future!

A final credit must go to the Landulph Art Group and friends who created the scenery, and all the backstage crew who almost made the evening run smoothly! But the biggest thank-you goes to producer-director, Sally Worth – please Miss, can we have some more!

An Easter Message

Which is your church? Many of you may respond 'I don't have one, thank you'. Others may point to a Methodist, Roman Catholic or other denomination, some may point toward their Mosque or Synagogue or other faith community.

By an accident of history, a parish church is there for everyone who lives in the parish of any faith or none. It's there to be alongside people as they rejoice, or when they grieve. Mostly, it's there to affirm life and all that's good in it.

When I arrived I was aware that some felt they couldn't join in worship. Families with young children particularly wanted something children could relate to. We've tried to meet their needs with a Family Service every six weeks or so. Morning Praise is also a service without Communion which some prefer. Communion services are still held regularly. We've also tried to make it easier with a regular service; every second and fourth Sunday at 10am in Landulph.

On Palm Sunday, we tell the story of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem on a donkey. On Good Friday 14 April, there's a simple service at 2.00pm, and a celebration of Easter on Sunday at 10am.
