

Landulph Parish August meeting

This is usually time-off for the Councillors, but an extraordinary meeting was held so that three planning applications could be considered and quickly disposed of. Other items were of more interest.

Parking Responding to a request that the Council look into parking congestion on Fore Street, the public was encouraged to convene an open public meeting so that problems and suggested solutions could be aired. (Note: A planned meeting has been postponed to allow more time for consultation – *Ed*).

Speeding Council will bid for funding for a 20mph speed limit from the Cross to the river but has not yet explained how this might be enforced. I for one would not volunteer to be a speed monitor with powers to clock my neighbours' speed and report offenders to the police.

Planning The Neighbourhood Development Plan grinds its stately way towards... something! You wouldn't have to be the brightest observer to get the feeling that the Plan's policy of restricting new-build homes to a maximum of five per site is causing the Council some discomfort. It was only a month ago that they were required by County to reconsider their rejection of Gideon Barrett's outline application for nine dwellings because they felt obliged to stick to the draft Neighbourhood Plan's limit.

The Council will soon have to approve or reject the draft Plan before its next step along the long road to completion, but at this meeting the Council queried whether there may be some advantage in setting a new limit of six dwellings per site. This would enable some benefits denied to sites with five.

As a Brexiteer I sympathise with all concerned because during the factfinding phase of our Plan's creation, none of us knew the ramifications of our decisions.

Poo-binning On a lighter note, a dog bin is to be installed at the bottom of Fore Street with costs of purchase and weekly emptying to be borne by the Parish Council. A site for the bin has been offered by the Slipway Quay residents at a peppercorn rent (Hooray!).

Councillor Shirlaw chaired, and dispatched a dull agenda in 57 minutes. Items of interest included:

 a report that Ewan Armstrong had to use a hacksaw to release a child who had become trapped in Penyoke playground's aircraft climbing frame. The child was undamaged and the frame is now taped off.

- the go-ahead has been given for immediate grass cutting of the river front embankment at the playing field, and the autumn sowing of Yellow Rattle seeds; this semi-parasitic plant will inhibit grasses next year and when it dies down will leave space for the sowing of wildflower seeds.
- More nature notes Amanda Pugh is our new Tree Warden.
- The Neighbourhood Development Plan has been tweaked in order to satisfy our Parish Council that adequate openings are available for affordable housing (see separate article). Rural Exception Sites are for affordable housing in small towns, villages and hamlets where there is a significant local need and demand for such housing and on condition that at least 50% of houses per site are affordable. Sites must be adjacent to existing built areas. If this mollifies our Council, they may approve the Plan at the October's meeting, but I cannot imagine that developers or Cornwall Council will be beating a path to Landulph as a result. Parish Plan in final stages

Landulph Plan is approaching its last hurdles before being completed. Thank you to everyone who read the plan and those of you who sent in comments during the recent six-week public consultation. All the comments from individual residents (without names, after the new data protection rules came in) and those from organisations, can be found on our website www.landulphplan.org.uk. You'll see that most comments are positive. The Parish Council and five individuals questioned the effect that a maximum of five dwellings per site in Policy 1 could have contributions to affordable housing. These are the contributions paid by developers to Cornwall Council to help fund affordable housing in Cornwall. At the Parish Council meeting in August, some members felt unable to approve the plan until this issue had been clarified. Therefore after several meetings we have amended Point 2 of Policy 1 to read: 'Affordable or low cost housing which will be delivered through Local Policy 9 Rural Exception Schemes, will be encouraged in order to sustain an evolving community.'

We must now seek formal approval of the plan from the Parish Council before we can return the plan to Cornwall to put before the Independent Examiner and hold a referendum.

On Tuesday 4 September Landulph Lively Ladies enjoyed an interesting and informative talk by Elen Thomas, one of Cornwall's female firefighters. Elen explained the current role of Cornwall Fire, Rescue and Community Safety Service, pointing out that the recent name change illustrates the evolving role of what was once known simply as the Fire Brigade.

A recent addition to the service is a Fire Boat which helps in accessing hard to reach areas up creeks and rivers. Two fire dogs, Archie and Woody, assist the Fire Investigation Unit by searching for traces of accelerants.



Elen reminded us to check electrical goods recall lists; that smoke alarms have a ten year life span; to have a planned route to exit your home in the event of a fire and to keep door keys in the same place so they can be easily located. Autumn Precaution For Dogs

As the temperatures drop and the leaves fall, we start to notice various mushrooms and toadstools appearing here and there. Our dogs notice them too - and sometimes eat them, roll in them or even inhale them. Like us, dogs can also succumb to *mycotoxicosis* ie toxins derived from fungi. Severe toxicity is fairly uncommon in the UK (although the recent warm damp weather led to four cases coming in to my work last week). As a general rule, the sooner the onset of clinical signs, the less toxic the fungi.

Several species of small field mushrooms (often found on lawns) can cause drooling, vomiting and diarrhoea if eaten. Other species can affect the liver, the kidneys and the nervous system. The one that surprises many people is mouldy bread which most of us would associate with the antibiotic powers of *penicillium* mould. This is not always the case. Some moulds on bread can cause fits and even death if eaten by your dog. Often the offending piece of mouldy crust is stolen from a compost bin or from the lawn after stale bread is put out for the birds. Other foods that may contain fungi harmful to your dogs are grapes and raisins, and blue cheese.

If you are worried that your canine companion may have consumed a poisonous mushroom, contact your vet and take a photo of the offending fungus if possible. There are 4,000 species of fungi present in the UK so they may not be able to identify it but, as they say, a picture speaks a thousand words.

On 20 November we will screening *Darkest Hour* a powerful re-creation of the early days of World War II when, within days of becoming Prime Minister, Winston Churchill (played by Gary Oldman for which he was awarded an Oscar) must face his most turbulent and defining trial: either exploring a negotiated peace or standing firm to fight for the ideals of liberty and freedom of the nation. Churchill has to withstand his darkest hour, rally a nation and attempt to change the course of history. Two excellent films and a warm welcome to all at the Landulph Film Club.

Cornish bees at risk

The cover of this issue of our Newsletter has been produced by Liz Dunn. Her artwork beautifully illustrates the splendid sunflowers that grew in her garden this summer and the various bees that visited her.

However, you might not know that our local bee populations, including the increasingly rare Cornish native bee, are under threat from a vicious



invader – the Asian hornet. This small but vigorous species, which is no more dangerous to humans than a honey bee, has been found as close by as Fowey where two nests have recently been destroyed. If you see an Asian hornet, you should report it using the links below.

Work is now on-going in Fowey to ensure no further nests are present. Local beekeepers in the surrounding area are supporting this effort, including in Liskeard where a single sighting of an Asian hornet occurred. Members of the public are also encouraged to report any further sightings of Asian hornets.

Nicola Spence, Defra Deputy Director for Plant and Bee Health, said: 'While the Asian hornet poses no greater risk to human health than a bee, we recognise the damage they can cause to honey bee colonies.' She added: 'During September the number of hornets in a nest can reach a peak and this will increase the chances of members of the public seeing this insect. I want to encourage people to look out for any Asian hornets and, if you think you've spotted one, please report your sighting through the Asian hornet app (available for iPhone or Android) or online. Search for Asian Hornet Watch or email alertnonnative@ceh.ac.uk. Identification guides and more information are available.
