Parish Council April/May

April's meeting transacted the usual business, including a statement by the chairman that consultations with Highways were moving towards an agreed policy for hedge-cutting.

May's meeting started with statements from the chairman. Martin Worth and our county councillor Mr Foot about their respective activities, and were followed by Kate Mitchell's summary of her role in reviewing regional NHS Community services. (These being the core items in the Annual Assembly. Some members of the audience were disappointed that the occasion was dignified by neither drinks nor nibbles). Ms Mitchell said that the future of St Barnabas hospital would be decided this year. The choice is between closure or modernisation. Its previous Minor Injuries service would soon be assumed by Saltash's two Health Centres during their normal working hours - but not just yet. Highdown roadside hedge-cutting was discussed at length, and it may be interesting to describe the convolutions. Early in May's meeting the chairman detailed his discussions with Highways, whose representative had recently visited Highdown to see for himself why the parish got vexed about this stretch of lane each year. He said that it did not need cutting 'at this time'.

When the right time came, County would write to landowners giving them a month to get the hedges cut. If they did not comply, County would organise a cut which might take another month. Our councillors were a bit stunned, but seemed to accept this Olympian formula. Councillor Andrew Butcher said that the parish council should repeat last year's action and commission and pay for a private cut. The parish Clerk said that they had no authority to do so. It was her duty to advise against such an action, as they would be acting illegally. Much laughter from councillors, and mention of visiting hours etc.

It was only when the meeting was about to wrap up, during any other business, that Councillor Marilyn Dennis asked what the they were going to do about the hedges given that they were already high and imminent filming in the village would increase traffic flow abnormally. Council decided to engage its own contractors at their own expense.

Landulph Neighbourhood Development Plan

A lot has happened since our last progress report in the December/January newsletter:

- 1 Cornwall organised another six-week consultation of organisations during January and February
- 2 An independent examiner, Andrew Ashcroft, visited Landulph incognito during March. His report on our plan provides good reading. He clarified some of the wording in places but has not altered the substance of anything. You can read the whole report on our website, landulphplan.org.uk and on the Landulph page of Cornwall Neighbourhood Planning website.

We are proud of this bit of the report:

Para 4.2 re the Consultation Statement. Its key strength is the way in which it sets out the key issues in a proportionate way which is then underpinned by more detailed appendices. It is a first-class model for others to follow.

He also made this comment on his visit

Para 5.12 Thereafter I looked at the area around the harbour. I saw the collection of distinctive cottages on Fore Street. At the harbour I saw the very impressive views to the east across the Tamar Estuary. I was struck by the overwhelming sense of quietness.

Cornwall Council has carried out final checks that the plan conformed to all necessary legislation. The final form of the Plan, with the modifications suggested by the examiner, is now printed and ready to go. It is on our website. Please read it because the final hurdle of the referendum is now imminent. This will be arranged by the Cornwall Council as soon as possible. They had to wait until after the European elections as they cannot both occur on the same day. We expect the referendum to be in July. Keep an eye out for posters.

Please read the plan, decide whether you think it will be good for the future of Landulph, then cast your vote in the referendum.

I believe the rules on postal votes apply to referenda also, so if you will be away in July, think about arranging a postal vote.

CYC stages manoverboard training day

Aware that many of its cruising members were 'well beyond peak muscle', John Davis, Commodore of the Cargreen Yacht Club, organized a special training day in May on recovering a person who has



fallen overboard. Falling overboard is the greatest fear of all cruising sailors and probably the biggest killer. John Davis pointed out that many club boats were crewed by just a husband and wife team where strength and stamina might be in short supply. He pointed out that it was often the husband who went overboard leaving his wife to rescue

Members were invited to bring their own boats and regular crew so that they could test their equipment and plan. Club members acted as casualties.

Many owners were surprised how difficult many of the standard recovery methods were, when dealing with a 'real' casualty, and how

their equipment was. Advice was given on how to mprove systems and recovery times.

Among the lessons learned were that it took up to seven minutes to return to a man in the water; some proprietary products worked quite poorly; it is vital to practice with your chosen method to make it quick, efficient and effective.

The event was a timely and salutary lesson with many participants going away to rethink their drills.

A Bird In The Hand

More junk mail; this time Western Power telling me that my power will be temporarily cut off due to 'extensive tree cutting'. After muttering to myself about it being a stupid time of year to do it, I make a note of the dates and times on the calendar and chuck it in the compost bin. Job done... no more thoughts wasted on the topic. Luckily for our dwindling garden bird population,

not only did others think about it more than I did, they did something about it too. Our local Tree Warden, Amanda Pugh, leapt into action by contacting the power company and our local council and reminding them of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981.

While many of you may be aware that it's an offence to kill or injure a wild bird or its eggs, most people are not aware that it is also an offence to intentionally disturb wild birds or their offspring while they are nesting (1 March to 31 August). This includes trimming trees, hedges, garden shrubs etc...



Within minutes of being notified, our local

councillor contacted the power company. An ecologist was called to survey the site where he found several nests of several different species. Consequently, only minor trimming was permitted and this had to be done with the ecologist present to supervise.

This may seem like a lot of fuss over a few common birds but the population of different species recorded by the RSPB over the last 40 years has declined dramatically. Numbers of the poor tree sparrow are down 95%, starling 71%, turtle dove 71%, song thrush 56% to name but a few. If we can save a few nests in a few trees in our little parish it all



contributes to the preservation of the rich species diversity around us.

How lucky those little birds are that my apathetic response to the letter from Western Power was offset by the prompt actions of our parish tree warden and local councillor and resultant cooperation by the power company.

How can we spend £1,200?

As part of the proposals for the North Wayton Solar Farm extension, an agreement was made for the applicants to provide an additional lump sum payment of £10,000 to Landulph Parish Council, for use in the parish for the benefit of the community as a whole. Roof fund rises

Money raising efforts to repair the roof of the Landulph Church tower are bearing fruit. The fund currently stands at £50,000 and is slowly heading towards the Parochial Church Council's (PCC) current target of £60,000. There have been some notable single donations including £7,500 from a private subscriber. The Landulph Festival of Music and the Arts has contributed £4,000 from its reserves. The Festival was started in 2002 mainly to raise funds for an earlier church roof appeal. £1,750 has come from the Churches' Trust, a wing of the Ecclesiastical Insurance company. The Dutchy of Cornwall's Cornwall Historic Churches Trust has given £5,500. The PCC itself has contributed £12,000. The Council is grateful to the many Landulph residents who have generously given money and time.
