Parish Council December 2018

There were nibbles and wine available before business at the December Parish Council meeting and again at the end, so with comfort and joy in mind let's be thankful that three parishioners volunteered to fill the vacancy for one councillor. After Libby Gawith, Roger Pugh and Andrew Butcher made their bids for office, Andrew was elected and is now our footpath rep. Philip Braund replaced Marc Shirlaw as Vice Chairman.

Potholes: could LPC commission a better repair service than County? Councillor Foote advised strongly against, saying that problems should be reported to Highways asap. Cornwall County had a target for repair within three days, weather permitting.

Much time was spent discussing the Council's purchase of a demountable extension for the Hall stage, mainly because the purchase had not been formally recorded as an agenda item at previous meetings nor any competitive tenders discussed. No-one disputed its possible value to the larger community even though its initial usefulness and urgent need were all about February's pantomime. Apparently it needed our councillors' approval to release the payment for the staging, which was due to be delivered the very next day! Despite their reservations about the path taken between start and finish, councillors approved the purchase, which will be paid from the Solar Park grant. This will leave about £1,900 remaining in the kitty.

Still on money matters, the Clerk advised that next year's Parish Precept would need an increase of 7% to stand still or 10% to stay healthy. Consternation! There'd be *gilets jaunes* causing civil unrest with pasty bonfires in the street if we imposed 10%. Calm down dear, households would have to pay only an additional £2.57 per year for a Band D property or £5.14 for a Band H. Phew; we've had quite enough stress recently. *Morton Macleod*

Rosehill development is rejected by PC

This day dawned after the spookily precise Super Blood Wolf Moon eclipse and ushered in the much-derided Blue Monday, claimed to be the most depressing day of the year. Fun-seekers may have been a tad disappointed with tonight's 115-minute long meeting in which most time was taken up with meticulous dissection of the Rosehill 40-house development proposal.

The developer's agent outlined its content, claiming that it was consistent with the Neighbourhood Development Plan. Public and councillors alike criticised the high density of housing, no provision of shop parking, inadequate private green space per smaller household, possible sewage management overload, and increased general traffic. Councillor Andrew Butcher pointed out that front doors of eight affordable homes and the shop frontage were accessed from a new pavement on Fore Street itself, with a risk of on-street parking. Council advised its rejection, listing its reasons to County. Approval was swiftly given for developments at North Wayton. These planning matters had filled the public galleries yet attracted few public comments. The rest of the meeting settled to routines of slight interest and the public thinned out, preferring to nod off at home.

Noting that a granite bollard had been cemented into the middle of Paradise Lane footpath/bridlepath to stop vehicular traffic (usually at night and without lights!), Council will seek County's advice on who bears responsibility for safe passage.

Chairman Martin Worth made another appeal for Landulph Emergency Plan volunteers. This is in response to a county-wide encouragement to organise a body of volunteers who might be useful in some emergency where the normal responders (Police, Fire & Rescue etc) might be slow or overwhelmed. In this parish Martin is looking for either skills or equipment that could be useful in a disaster, such as a Lockerby-type plane crash. He mentioned farmers with heavy all-terrain transport & earth-moving equipment, and medical/nursing skills.

The Chairman also reported that extension of the 20mph speed limit to the bottom of Fore Street would be implemented soon, but that Speed Watch Team volunteers would need safe road-side spots from which to monitor us. So if you have a suitable corner of your garden wall that could be a speed-gun emplacement... shhh.

Landulph Church Needs YOU

Do you know?

- 94% of the respondents to the 2017 Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire circulated to every house in the Parish said that Landulph Church was very important or fairly important to them.
- The Tower roof lead covering needs urgent repair and other preservation works. The provisional estimate for the cost is £60,000. Because of Grade 1 listing cheaper options cannot be used. To date money raised through applications from other charities, including a grant from Allchurches Trust, and by considerable efforts and generosity of the congregation, is around £30,000.
- The balance is urgently needed so that work can start in the early summer. Look out for the Tower Appeal sign at Landulph Cross, indicating progress towards our target.
- The Diocese assures us that there are no plans for the church to stop being used for regular worship, nor is there any pastoral reorganisation planned which would affect its role. However the church gets no money from the Diocese for maintenance and repairs and the parish are required to make our very best efforts to raise the necessary money.
- The Tower has an excellent peal of six bells that are frequently rung by teams of ringers. It is also home to a protected colony of bats.
- Landulph Church stands on a Celtic 'Lan' or oval churchyard site, close to the River Tamar, and is dedicated to St Dilph,
- possibly one of the 24 missionary saint children of Brychan, and St Leonard who was added in the Middle Ages.
- It is thought that much of the present Church including the Tower was rebuilt in the 15th century, although the font and tower base and some walling may be Norman. Landulph was then a thriving port and departure point for Pilgrims to the shrine of St James at Compostella in Northern Spain.
- Our beautiful Church is well known as the resting place of Theodore Paleologus a descendent of the rulers of the once mighty Byzantine Christian Empire. In 1962 the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh visited Landulph Church to see the memorial plaque of his ancestor.

Bats in Cargreen

In August 2018 we were lent a bat detector for three nights from The Devon Wildlife Trust. The recorder was a microphone and receiver in a toughened plastic box that we fixed to the top of the pergola in our garden at Three Corner Meadow. This survey is being run as part of the Devon

Greater Horseshoe Bat Project, which is a five-year partnership project of 18 organisations (including the Tamar Valley AONB) and led by Devon Wildlife Trust.

Bats find their prey through echo-location; this is where the bat calls at a very high frequency (most humans cannot hear this - although children are sometimes able to) and listens for the return call as it bounces off an object. It is these calls that the bat detector we borrowed recorded, and

many of these are distinctive to a particular bat, or a group of bats. There are 18 species of bats in the UK. Our detector recorded 10 species including common pipistrelle, long-eared bat, soprano pipistrelle, lesser horseshoe and Mmotis species. The barbastelle, daubentons's bat, greater horseshoe and whiskered must be lonely as only a single pass was recorded for these species.

Having watched the bats at dusk flying in our garden we were fascinated to discover that there were so many different species. Having always tried to garden in a way to encourage wild life we are delighted that our unstructured and untidy form of gardening works.

Good neighbour saves elderly resident

The Parish website may well have saved the life of an elderly Cargreen resident.

The woman's granddaughter, who lives three hours from Cargreen, had become concerned about her grandmother when she was unable to contact her by phone. She looked up the Parish on-line and found the name of its Chairman, Martin Worth.

Martin takes up the story: 'I was having a quiet Friday evening at home when the phone rings. It is a young woman who has found my address and phone number from the parish website.

'Whilst continuing the call on hands free, I went round to the house to find it was locked, lights were off and there was post still in the letterbox. I alerted concerned neighbours, only to find that the designated keyholder was away. Whilst the other neighbours tried to locate a key, I tried to gain entry from the back of the house which is normally inaccessible. I scaled two fences (with a torch in my mouth!), into her back garden and on shining my torch in the window, I saw a person lying on the floor. Much to my relief, she made a movement as the torchlight shone on her. Having consulted with the grand-daughter, I managed to break open the French windows and go to the lady's aid. She was cold and confused but conscious. I covered her with some bedding and with that, thankfully, the neighbours who have found a key, entered via the front door. The emergency services (an ambulance and a first responder) arrive within twenty minutes and took the patient off to hospital.

I am pleased to report that she has since made a good recovery. I later learned she had fallen more than once, having become disorientated and dehydrated over the previous 18 to 24 hours that she had lain on the floor. Her emergency panic alarm had been activated but due to an error had not been connected. This whole experience made me realise how important it is to double check all arrangements made for the wellbeing of the elderly and vulnerable in our parish.'
